The great strike in I.ondon, which began with the dock-laborers, but has since extended to the operatives of almost every department of husiness and supply, is really a serious matter. Wednesday's ad.ices add to the list coal-porters a.d mail cartmen, and several other occupations of vital impor tanco to the course of business. The inhabitants of smaller torns can scarcely realize what it is to paralyze the supplies of such a city as Iondon, but this is, in effect, what is being done. So general is the movement that premeditation migt t be suspected, bat it i, more probably imatation and the perception of an opportunity to make tho porser of the laboring classes felt. In thic, if it be theit object, they will no doubt achieve a signal suecess, and the experience of a great power will not bs without its effect in the future. The dock campanies scem to have set the ball relling by their refusal to entertain arbitration. At the time of our going to press the situation scems really alarming. Fvery trade is paralyzed, and the four millions of people which london contains will, if the strike continue, be reduced to a condition of desperation. Some means of concliation will. however, probably bo arrived at $b$.fore matters come to the worst.

The physicians ot the Bumingham lunanc Asylum appear to have dis covered " $\because$ a new use for rabbits.".
