

B.-The Americans who are now boring in the eld eil region at Memrancook, in the hope of striking petroleum in paying quantities, have gone down to a depth of between 500 and 600 feet. Last week, at a depth of 300 feet, oil sandstones, similar to the first sand stones at Oil Creek, Pennsylvania, were reached, but after passing through these for 18 feet, black shale again came to the surface and has centinued since.
