CITY AND ELSEWHERE.

To-morrow is Holy Thursday.

M. E. HUGHES left on Wednesday last by the N. P. for Duluth.

The English pilgrimage that made its way to Rome on the occasion of the papal jubilee is said to have been the largest since the days of Henry XIII.

St. JOSEPH'S Day, March 19th was the twenty-second anniversary of Cardinal Taschereau of Quebec, his consecration as successor to Archbishop Bailligan. The occasion was of an interesting ceremony.

The raffle which was to take place on March 23rd by the St. Joseph's union has been postponed till April 27th when it will be raffled in their hall McDermot St. at 8 o'clock p. m.

His Grace has been pleased to signify his intention of being present at the entertainment to be given by the boys of St. Boniface College. This, and the interest taken in it by many friends will be a spur to urge the students to do justice to Cardinal Wiseman's great play.

Now that St. Cutbert's Church is built, and beautiful, it will be more easy to carry out more completely the services of Holy Week. Besides the Mass on Holy Thursday, on Good Friday morning there will be Mass of the personified in the evening at 7.30, Passion Sermon.

THE work for the educational exhibit at the Chicago World's Fair by the pupils of St. Mary's boys' school in charge of the Brothers of Mary, teaching in this city is finished and has been sent to Chicago in the early part of this week. The exhibit comprises exercises in grammar, dictation, penmanship, arithmetic, composition, drawing, (linear and freehand etc.) map drawing and tasks of pupils. It will be exhibited in the Liberal Arts' Building on the Exhibition grounds with the Catholic Educational Exhibit of the United States, and not at the Greenway side-show outside of the grounds.

The Catholic Mirror thus reports the sad death of the Rev. Michael E. McCarty, of St. Peter's church, Baltimore, which sad occurrence happened on the 15th inst., while returning to the parochial residence from a sick call. In the dark he ran into a picket fence and fell striking on his head with sufficient force to cause death. His body was not discovered till daylight. Father McCarty was thirty-two years old and was assigned to the local parish but seven weeks ago. His home was in New Haven.

A VERY sad death occurred in the cars of the east express which arrived here in three sections on Thursday last. Mrs. Verbene a native of Belgium, aged 75 years and mother of Mrs. Castleman, who settled in St. Boniface last year. She complained of being ill two or three days before but it was thought that if she could stand travelling till she reached Winnipeg, she would receive better attention in the hospital here than if she stayed over on the way. In the morning however she became much worse and about eight o'clock died. A message was sent to the authorities here and on the arrival of the train the body was taken to the undertaker's. The remains were interred in the St. Boniface cemetery on Saturday last.

At Vespers: "Emmerig's Grand Magnificat," "Lambillotte's Laudate pueri Dominum" and Berger's "Tantum Ergo." Mrs. B. Bernhart will sing Miller's "Ave Verum," Mrs. Geo. Germain will preside at the organ.

ST. MARY'S NEW SPIRE.

Subscriptions Have Begun to Come in for The Erection of a New Spire For St. Mary's Church.

Two hundred dollars have already been received viz. 100 from Rev. Fr. Fox, 50 from Mr. Dennis Lennon, 25 from the late William Enright, and 25 from Mr. William Jordan.

When the Fathers of St. Mary's shall have received \$2,000, they will commence work.

The Fish of Manitoba and the Territories.

Mr. R. LaTuche Tupper, Superintendent of the fish hatchery at Selkirk, has offered, through the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition Association, a prize of \$20 for the best essay on "The Fishes of the Lake Winnipeg Basin and its Tributaries," which includes all lakes and streams whose waters ultimately find their way into Lake Winnipeg. The essays are to deal with the names of the different varieties of fish found in these waters, their localities, habits of food, time of spawning, mode of capture, whether increasing or decreasing, and suggestions as to the best mode of preservation. Mr. Tupper's object is to create more interest in the food supply of fishes, by inviting competition among students and others in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories in the study of our streams and lakes. The essays will be received by the Secretary of the Industrial Exhibition, Winnipeg, up to July 17th next.

THE RUMORTOO PREVIOUS.

Archbishop Tache Interrogated on the Question of a Coadjutor -No Step Yet Taken.

Le Manitobais informed that Archbishop Tache was asked how the telegraphic and newspaper reports of the appointment of a coadjutor bishop should be regarded, and that he answered: "I am very sensible of the interest which the press or those who inspire it take in me; everybody here knows that I am infirm, and that there would be work for a coadjutor, so the idea which is perhaps a suggestion is not a bad one; only those who speak or write on this subject say a great deal too much about it, since I have, as yet, made absolutely no approaches to Rome to obtain this happy result." In this connection three occasions are recalled when similar rumors have been published, going even so far as to mention the names of the clergymen reported to have been selected, that of Rev. Father Lefebvre having been named in the first instance, and Rev. Father Langevin in the third and last. The selections are admitted to have been well made, the names being quite worthy to be sent to Rome; but it is added that the archdiocese of St. Boniface and its clergy have not yet taken any step or expressed any desire in this direction.—Free Press.

Royal Convert to Catholicity.

Few people will be astonished in Germany if the announcement that the Grand Duke of Baden has become a convert to the Catholic Church proves to be correct. Notwithstanding the fact that he has hitherto figured as one of the principal supporters of the Lutheran Church, it is no secret that both the Grand Duchess and himself have long shown a marked inclination for the Catholic form of worship. They are both known to have been in entire accord as far as matters of faith are concerned, with the Grand Duchess' mother the late Empress Augusta, who is popularly believed and reported to have become a convert to the church of Rome just before her death.
