Frankly, I would say that this House and the public of Canada now know less about the spending programs of the government under the new rules because the estimates cannot be discussed when they are reported back to the House from the committees except in a very superficial way on opposition days. There is now less information and less control of these estimates.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Lambert (Edmonton West): This is due to a combination of a number of factors and I, who have been here for some years, regret that we are not in a position to at least consider some of the departments in the House because the President of the Privy Council will move a motion in a few moments to refer the consideration of the estimates to the various appropriate committees. I do not mean a nuts and bolts operation in the House, but I wish that the estimates could at least be considered in the House so that the House could have control over them.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Lambert (Edmonton West): This is another example of the so-called directed bureaucracy with which we are being saddled, and I think it is a crying shame that government in Canada should be taking that trend.
