Captain Crooksbanks also gave Signals and Instructions to such Merchant Ships as were then at Spithead waiting for Convoy, for their Guidance, and better keeping him Company in the Lark.

The Beaufort joined Captain Crook/banks, who failed down the Channel, on the 15th of June, and anchored the 17th in Plymouth Sound, where he made up his Convoy, and failed from thence the 20th in Company with the Warwick, Beaufort Transport, and the Montagu Packet. This Packet was in the Service of the Office of Ordnance, and was commanded by Mr. Gonnelly, who took Orders and Instructions to repeat what Signals he could; and he was very active and useful, for his Vessel, tho small, was

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
