Nor is it one of the fmalleft advantages refulting from the war, that it diffinguishes our friends from our foes, and rids us of all those traitors and falle friends whom a fhort fighted and miltaken policy had introduced among us .- The very able measures adopted by our Legislature for punishing traitors and defending the country, may be juftly confidered a caufe of joy. They allowed no temporary difcordancies to deftroy that harmony which was fo neceffary at fuch a They have fulfilled the just expectations crifis. of our Parent state, which had a right to expect every exertion on the part of her Colonies for their own defence. This noble pre-eminence of harmony and patriotifm in our Legislature must not be loft ; it acquires us the effeem of all good men and the warm affection of our Mother Country.

Behold then, my brethren, fome of the reafons which call for our gratitude and praife.— Behold with what force the paffing events illuftrate the doctrine of my text; the Divine Providence carefully watching over the happiness of the world.
