

federation, and in R. Jebb's *The Britannic Question; a Survey of Alternatives* (1913), J. S. Ewart's *The Kingdom Papers* (1912-), and A. B. Keith's *Imperial Unity and the Dominions* (1916), which criticize that solution from different standpoints. The *Reports* of the Imperial Conferences of 1887, 1894, 1897, 1902, 1907, 1911, 1917, are of much value. Relations with the United States are discussed judiciously in W. A. Dunning's *The British Empire and the United States* (1914). Phases of Canada's recent development other than political are covered best in the volumes of *Canada and its Provinces*, a History of the Canadian people and their institutions, edited by A. Shortt and A. G. Doughty.

A useful guide to recent books dealing with Canadian history will be found in the annual *Review of Historical Publications Relating to Canada*, published by the University of Toronto (1896 to date).
