warded to me by the last mail.



Nearly all the Catholics in Jamaica are colored. Would there be any hope of such persons gaining admission into your order, if not, in America at least in Belgium? I am looking forward to the time when I shall be able to open an Industrial School for boys in Jamaica. It would lighten some of the difficulties if I could see a hope of forming a creole community. I shall be much obliged to you if you can furnish me with any information on the point.
