ROCHESTER, N.Y., Sept. 27.—President Chapin to-day withdrew all objection he raised last night to a change in the plans for the all-star series, and the amended plan will be carried out. It means that Baltimore will entertain the rival teams on Saturday, and that they will play the fourth of the series in Newark on Sunday. MISS CAMPBELL SCORES EASY WIN AT OTTAWA

Two Hamilton, One Toronto and One Woodstock Lady Will Fight It Out for Championship.

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—The ladies' championship for 1911 of the Royal Canadian Golf Association rests between Miss Dorothy Campbell, Miss Florence Harvey (both of Hamilton), Miss Muriel Dick of Rosedale and Miss Florence Nesbitt of Woodstock. These four Western Ontario players survived the second round in the championship competition, which was decided to-day over the links of the Ottawa Club. Four eastern players went down to defeat during the day and thus assured Hamilton, Toronto or Woodstock of the amateur title for another season. Mrs. Franklyn Ahearn of Ottawa, in whom many had relied to carry the colors of the local club into the final, succumbed after a brilliant match, before Miss Dock, while Miss Katie Christie, Ottawa's other player, was eliminated in the second round, was eliminated by Miss Nesbitt. Miss Campbell, who seems invincible, defeated Miss Muriel Dick, a comparatively easy win over Miss Bauld of Halifax, and Miss Phoebe, Montreal's solitary hope following the defeat of Miss Henry-Anderson, who lost to Miss Harvey of Hamilton. Notice to O. R. F. Clubs. The attention of O.R.F.U. clubs is drawn to the following: No player may play in any two clubs in the same season. No player who has played with a club in the interprovincial Union, the Intercollegiate Union, or the O.R.F.U. in the same year, unless it be in a higher series, without permission from the executive.

Forms will be issued to each club, and they must be properly filled in with the names of the players and placed in the hands of the referee before play commences. They must bear the signature of the secretary and manager of the club, and also as to the eligibility of the said players. The forms must be signed by the referee and forwarded to the secretary of the union immediately after each game. The club must provide absolute protection for visiting clubs and must keep the spectators from encroaching on the touch-line or field. The home club will be held responsible for any rowdiness on the part of the crowd which may be directed against a visiting club. Rowdiness on the part of the players of either club, whether senior or junior, will be severely dealt with by the union.

The playing rules of the Canadian Rugby Union govern all O. R. F. U. games. The principal changes in the rules of last year is the right of teams to substitute players at will. When competing clubs agree upon a referee they must notify the secretary of the union to that effect at least three days before the match, otherwise officials will be appointed by the union. No member of a club is eligible to play in a junior game who has played more than once in any one season on a senior team. Permits may be obtained for intermediate players. All protests must be accompanied by statutory declarations substantiating the disputed points, and by the sum of \$25, which sum will be forfeited to the union should the executive disallow the protest. The rule books for 1911 are out of the publishers' hands and will be issued to clubs on request. Clubs are reminded that dues are due and payable to the secretary.
