HOME RUN DRIVE ROUTED THE PESTS

**Sandberg Did the Trick—
Leafs Overcome Early
Skeeter Lead.**

Sandberg's trusty club beat Bill Donovan's Jersey Pests when they made their final appearance of the season at the Exhibition yesterday. As usual the Skeeters drew their fill of the Leafs that left a sore spot on the reputation of Gibson's squad for some little time. This season was a three-run inning that the Pests opened the game with. The Leafs caught them and Sandberg's swing killed the Pests in the sixth. The final was 5 to 3.

Our Robert Heck started like a broken down filly, but once he changed into high he only touched the high spots and left the Jersey band wagon far in the rear. The Pests critics opened with a three-run and a three-hit bombardment, added a fourth in the second and then fed out of Bobby's hand for the rest of the day. Not a safety did Donovan's trailers get after the second.

On the other hand the Leafs made free with three Jersey fingers, and had a very profitable afternoon. Speed Spencer had a large time with three cracks. Fourth International Tournament Opens With Great Entry.

As was expected, the opening day of the fourth international trapshooting tournament at the Exhibition, broke all records when the marksmen took part. Shooters are here from New Orleans in the south to Los Angeles in the west and more are expected this morning.

To C. N. Lanes of Toronto goes the honor of having the best score in the morning, he breaking 99 out of 100. He had also the long run for the day, with three shooters breaking 92 in the afternoon: E. F. Woodward, Houston, Tex.; F. S. Wright, Buffalo, and H. Fender, East of Boston, N.Y.

Unlike the program of former years, the tournament this year is divided into four classes, and this classification has helped to swell the entry.

Six professionals are at the tournament: J. S. Box of Chicago, Dr. Morris Edmonson, D. Dunk of Toronto, F. Huseman of Rochester, F. A. Wadsworth and L. Squire.

The program for today is series No. 2, events 1 to 5 (15 targets), which begins at 10 o'clock, while series No. 4 of the same events as the morning, will take place at 2 o'clock. It will be followed by the first half of the C. N. E. doubles championship.
