REMEDIAL BILL IN OHIO.

S. A. Not on the School Question, But to Remedy a Theatre Grievance.

Columbus, Ohio.April 4.—Some weeks ago, Hon. Philip C. Fosdick, representative from Hamilton County in the State Legislature, paid \$16 for the privilege of seeing Sir Henry Irving. His seat happened to be behind a stack of millinery, and the result was that his view was seriously obstructed. Then he resolved to introduce a bill in the Legislature to do away with the nuisance, and this is the bill, which has become law:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio that any owner, lessee, proprietor or manager of any theatre, hall, opera house, or any such building where theatrical or other performances are given, where an admission fee is charged, who permits or suffers any person or persons during the performance in such theatre, hall, opera house or building where such performance is given, to wear a hat sufficiently large to obstruct the view of persons sitting behind her, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than ten nor less than two dollars. Every hat permitted to be worn in violation of the law will constitute a separate offence.

Section 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passare.
