The same address was delivered before the Board of Trade last November, and was illustrated by a series of lime light views, showing many of the principal factories on the banks of the canal, with their facilities for handling freight, etc. Aiready the canal has cost \$75,000,000, and is not yet entirely completed. The enterprise, now-ever, is no longer an experiment, but is yielding substantial returns. The route of this great canal was traced from the mouth of the Mersey to Manchester, 36 miles in length. The canal affords passage for deep draught ocean liners right up to Manchester.
