

SNAPPED SHAFT AT SEA.

Steamer Noordland at Philadelphia After Serious Mishap.

Philadelphia, Jan. 16.—The Noordland arrived at her dock at 9 o'clock to-night. Capt. Roberts said that from the time the Noordland left Liverpool on Dec. 30 the steamer had continuous heavy west gales. The strain on the engines was so great that on Jan. 2 500 miles out from Queenstown, the eccentric strap—on the main shaft snapped and the big yessel was at the mercy of the waves. The zhip laid helpless for nearly two days and pitched so violently that everything moveable was thrown about. Those on board had difficulty in moving about. The passengers, the frightened, were calm, altho much fear was shown by the steerage passengers. The captain stated that while repairs were being made heavy seas were shipped, one of which carried away about 30 feet of the aft rail. Temporary repairs having been made the Noordland resumed her voyage under half speed on Jan. 4. The Noordland will sail for Liverpool on Tuesday.






