What the Fire Has Shown.

Beaumont Jarvis, the architect, who has twice visited the scene of the Baltimore fire, stated that building methods are still in an experimental stage, and that present systems must practically be revolutioized to render buildings fireproof. He mentiqued the following as some of the lessons of Tucsday night's blaze:

1. Brick stood the flames best of all.

2. Bricks should not be laid in lime mortar. But in cement.

3. The walls should be heavier.

4. Little or no wood should be used in construction.

construction.

5. Stone will not stand fire.

6. Steel, Iron and wood in construction should not be used unless they are properly protected with fireproofing materials.

7. Floors and partitions should be in concrete, armored with metal.

8. The Baltimore fire proved that concrete stood the fire test best of all.

9. The so-called fire shutters, projecting windows, are of little use, and automatic concrete shutters are the only device that fire will not affect. VALUE OF WIRED GLASS.

VALUE OF WIRED GLASS.

Concrete and wired glass, in the estimation of Professor Charles L. Norton of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, demonstrated their great worth in the Baltimore conflagration. Professor Norton, who is engineer in charge of the insurance engineering experiment station, gave an address in the Walker Building last night before the Society of Arts of the institute. He has spent several weeks investigating the effects of teon the various buildings, according to their construction, and as a result has obtained some information that will be of interest to those connected with office and other buildings in the business sections of great cities. The lecture was flustrated by numerous pictures of buildings partially destroyed.

Some of his conclusions are that the possibility of conflagration should be obviated by laws against storing explosive merchandise and cere in installing ventilation systems and thermostat systems, resulting in less dauger of fire spreading by explosion; by protection by means of non-inflammable roof materials, shutters, and wired glass and roof bydrants, and by the use of materials freproof more than in name. The modern steel-frame "fireproof" building came in for some consideration. As to the steel itself, Professor Norton found it generally in god condition, and not affected noticeably either by the fire or corrosion provious to it.

As to the buildings, he found that red brick walls stood the test well, while much more damage was noticed in those of lighter brick, with terra cotta ornamentation. Stone, whether granite, marble, sandstone or limestone, fared badly. WHERE FLOOR ARCHES AND STEEL COVER. INGS WERE OF CONCRETE THEY STOOD THE TEST MUCH BETTER THAN TERRA COTTA. 


