HIDING THE NEWS AWAY.

Berlin, May 12.—The German press continues to draw as dark a veil as it can over the Japanese victory over the Yalu. The papers publish the news in back parts of their editions without special headlines, and in the way of comment they advise their readers to regard these reports with skepticism, as they emanate from English sources. Reuter's Agency is particularly attacked in this connection.

The military critics are silent. The military Kreiszeitung says nothing, merely publishing two short telegrams under the heading "The War Between Japan and Russia," so that the casual reader would hardly gather that any battle had been fought at all. The Lokalanzeiger, too, has refrained from publishing extra editions.

To those who remember the manner in which every incident of the Boer war was served up by the German press, the present well-ordered reserve is highly significant politically.

The Leipzig Tageblatt, in a telegram from Riga, says that reports of a big Russian victory are being hawked about there, and that the harbor-master called upon the foreign vessels at anchor to dress ship, all doing so except the British and Norwegian vessels.

Trifly in Real Life.

Paris, May 12.—Mme. Magdalene, who is known as the hypnotic dancer, gave a special exhibition of her graceful powers yesterday at the Theatre de Mathurins. Unhappily, she cannot dance, and is not at all susceptible to the influence of music. When hypnotized, however, she shows extraordinary ordinary sensitivities to all kinds of music that she is able to translate the sentiments of the composers into a series of the most wonderful movements. Two well-known French factors went on to the platform yesterday, and Mme. Magdalene thru the most rigid tests before certifying that she was hypnotized. She will shortly appear in London.

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MR. GIBSON GETS EAR OF SIR WILFRID

His Visit Following That of Premier Ross Sets Tongues a-Wagging.

Attorney-General Gibson was in Ottawa yesterday and is reported to have had an interview with Premier Laurier and other federal leaders on the present political situation. No doubt, this referred particularly to Ontario. The present uncertainty in Ontario politics with regard to the length of the present parliament is causing considerable anxiety to the followers of the Liberal party in Ontario, and Mr. Gibson's visit coming on the heels of the visit of Premier Ross to Ottawa, a couple of weeks ago, has set the tongues a-wagging again.

Two Years to Run.

A great many people affect to believe that the present parliament will be allowed to run its course. It has two years yet to go before the effluxion of time necessitates the holding of a new election. Premier Ross may decide to hold on until that time, but there is no doubt that if he does it will be because he has received such advice from the federal leaders. The time the election protests are docketed for September next, and if they are allowed to go forward, it is evident that the Conservatives will be willing to drop two or three of the Liberal protests in lieu of a position against Mr. Dunlop being allowed to fall thru. Now, however, it is stated that the protests will be allowed to go to trial. If the Conservatives are held, which may be under a new law passed at the last session of the house within three months of the date of such vacancies.

Not Actions for Elections.

A prominent Liberal member of the legislature stated to The World yesterday that he did not expect an early action for the election of a new government. He said that the cabinet ministers at the present time is taken to mean that a general house-clearing is under way. The recent appointment of a railway sub-committee of the council indicates, so far as it indicates anything, that the government is going to hang on. Mr. Gibson's visit to Ottawa yesterday is believed by some to have had something to do with his intention to acquire better of the chief justice of the new executive court. This office has been held open for Mr. Gibson for some time, and it is barely possible that the federal authorities are urging Mr. Gibson to accept at once, and that the summons to Ottawa may have been sent on that account.

Prohibition in Background.

The question of prohibitory legislation has been almost lost sight of since the prorogation. George P. Graham, M.L.A., writes in his own paper of the difficulties that beset Premier Ross in his endeavor to get his followers to follow him on the temperance question. He says, in effect, that it is up to the Dominion government to grant the request of the alliance and practically throw the whole question out of provincial politics. Mr. Graham remarks: "But right here comes in a peculiar difficulty. Mr. Ross proposed the most stringent of these three methods which includes government control of shops, but his party were not all in accord with him. His proposition was a most drastic one. But what did the Dominion Alliance do? It met, and in spite of the protest of the best temperance men, it condemned any proposition including government control of shops, but the W.C.T.U. did likewise. Miss Wiggins in Brockville also spoke against government control. Thus it is that the two bodies that are supposed to represent the temperance sentiment of this province turn down the government's request, and the power to grant. The temperance organizations have practically said that they do not have anything but prohibition, which a

Student and Lover Kill Five.

Vienna, May 12.—A desperate fight with students by a student named Gerzinski and his eighteen-year-old sweetheart is reported from Warsaw. The police had received information that Gerzinski had a secret press for the printing of revolutionary literature, and made a raid upon the establishment. They found the student and the girl standing in a narrow passage leading to the entrance, armed with revolvers and a sword. Gerzinski did they use these weapons before being captured that five of the search party had died of the wounds they received.

Summer School at Kingston.

Kingston, May 12.—The education department has authorized the holding of a summer school in this city during July for the instruction of teachers in the new course of study to be introduced in the public schools next September.
