## TOKIO IS SUSPICIOUS OF THE CZAR

REPORTS FROM FRONT BELIEVE PEACE

Russian Army Corps Being Mobilized—A General's Boast—M. Witte is Given Hearty Send-Off From St. Petersburg.

Tokio, July 19.—It is believed that

Emperor Nicholas recently sent an en-

couraging message to Gen. Linvitch,

promising him men, provisions and

other necessities for attaining an ulti-

mate victory. It was also reported that

the Russian Emperor recently ordered

the mobilization of four army corps.

This fact, taken in connection with the

limitation of M. Witte's power, and the

fact that Russia is not sincere in her

expressed desire for the conclusion of

peace, heavy seas are still raging off

the coast of the island of Sakhalin, and

reports of the Japanese operations there

are not expected in the near future.

## Russian Army in Good Shape.

Headquarters of the Russian army,

Codyzant, Manchuria, July 19.—An

Associated Press correspondent at the

military situation, Gen. Zayonov,

commander of the third Manchurian

army, today adopted a most optimistic

tone. He declared the Japanese were

unable to advance both on account of

the strengthening of the Russian posi-

tions and because they have not fully

recovered from the battle of Mukden. He

said: "Never during the whole war has

the Russian army been so well equipped

as at present. The Japanese know this,

and therefore they wish to peace."
