adults, 3. The report of the board of managers was read by Secretary D. Forsyth. Tnanks were expressed to the members and adherents of the church for their generous support, and particularly to the Ladies' Aid Society, the Y. P. S. C. E. and Sunday school for their financial assistance. Attention was called to the envelope system, and could be shown was commented on as being all the more gratifying, considering that last year \$420 had been paid out in the form of donations and special funds over and above the regular source of revenue which was available for general expenses. The only liability is the mortgage of \$3,500 on

the church building and site. The financial statement presented by Treasurer H. Brownlee was very satisfactory.
