GENERALLY FAIR AND MILD.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 11—8 p.m.—The high area is now centered over the Ottawa valley, whence it is likely to pass southwest with diminishing energy to the Atlantic. The pressure is low, and the weather mild throughout the western portion of the continent. At present there is no indication of another cold wave in the Northwest. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Kamloops, 20-24; Calgary, 14-32; Qu'Appelle, 6-20; Port Arthur, 8-26; Parry Sound, 30 below-10; Toronto, 3 below-18; Ottawa, 20 below-2 below; Montreal, 14 below-2 below; Quebec, 14 below-8; Halifax, 4 below-14.

NEW INDUSTRY FOR LONDON.
Application has been made for the incorporation of the Cannon Stove and Oven Company, Limited, with a capital stock of \$20,000, for the manufacture of the "Economy Gasoline Stove" and the "Quick-Baker Oven." These articles are the invention of Mr. Charles Cannon, of Ridout street, city, and were patented in April, 1898. The provisional directors are Charles Cannon, George H. Cumming, and James Henry Dunn. The manufacture has already been begun at the company's factory, 197 King street. Mr. Cannon says that he made and sold about 300 of these stoves in 1898, but was unable, with the capital at his disposal, to supply the demand, and this company has been formed to make them on a large scale. This is another addition to the manufacturing industries of our city.

"CIRCUS GIRL" TONIGHT.

KING STREET PRESBYTERIANS

Conclude Their Silver Jubilee Year.

A Pleasant Annual Meeting—Presentation to Rev. and Mrs. Wilson—Elections to the Board of Managers—Gratifying Reports.

The silver jubilee of the King Street Presbyterian Church was pleasantly celebrated last night at the meeting of the congregation for the transaction of the annual business. Financially, the church was never before in such good condition, 1898 being the first year in which outside assistance was not received. The meeting was largely attended.

After devotional exercises the minister, Rev. Thomas Wilson, was chosen chairman and the business of the evening was speedily proceeded with. Mr. Wilson presented the report of the session, showing an increase in the church membership during the year of 46. The membership on the roll Jan. 1, 1898, was 204; removed by death, 1; removed by certificate, 21; added by certificate, 32; added by profession of faith, 38; making total additions 65 and present membership 310. The baptisms during the year were, infants, 13; adults, 2.

The report of the board of managers was read by Secretary D. Forsyth. Thanks were expressed to the members and adherents of the church for their generous support, and particularly to the Ladies' Aid Society, the Y. P. S. C. E. and Sunday school for their financial assistance. Attention was called to the envelope system, and the fact that a clean balance sheet could be shown was commented on as being all the more gratifying, considering that last year \$420 had been paid in the form of donations and special funds over and above the regular source of revenue which was available for general expenses. The only liability is the mortgage of \$3,500 on the church building and site.

The financial statement presented by Treasurer H. Brownlee was very satisfactory. The receipts were: Cash on hand Jan. 1, 1898, \$217 15; weekly collections, \$1,672 94; Ladies' Aid Society, \$136 82; lectures, \$73 84; Sunday school, \$20; Y. P. S. C. E., \$2; interest, \$1 80; collection for missions, \$145 95; total, \$2,327 50. The expenditures amounted to \$2,181 67, and included \$58 79 for improvements to the church building, and \$1,300 on stipend account.

The Sabbath school report was read by Secretary W. H. Yeomans, and showed the number of scholars on the roll to be 215; teachers and officers, 29, or a total of 244—a decrease during the year of 30.

The statement of Treasurer H. Brownlee showed receipts \$144 81 and a balance on hand of \$2 38. Rev. Mr. Wilson is superintendent and Mr. A. Dobbin assistant superintendent of the school.

Mrs. D. Scott, on behalf of the Ladies' Aid Society of which she is secretary, reported 11 meetings held during the year. Contributions amounted to \$137 60. A harvest home was conducted and netted \$21. The thanksgiving offerings totalled \$39 77.

Mrs. W. Llewellyn Tatle, the treasurer of the Ladies' Aid, presented the financial statement, showing receipts \$218 29, of which \$164 82 was paid to the board of managers.

The Woman's Foreign Mission Society, represented by Mrs. George Campbell, the secretary, who reported ten meetings held during the year, conducted chiefly by the vice-president, Mrs. Forsyth, in the absence of the president, Mrs. (Rev.) Wilson, who has been ill. The amount raised was \$35 57, which was devoted chiefly to mission work in India.

Miss Winnifred Forsyth, treasurer of the Golden Links, reported receipts \$25 80; disbursements, \$14 02. The officers for 1899 are: President, Miss G. O'Dermid; vice-president, Miss L. Forsyth; secretary, Miss D. Wichman; treasurer, Miss D. Moule.

The mission report read by Mr. Duncan showed receipts by monthly collections \$116 10 and by donations, \$29 35; disbursements to foreign missions, \$50; to augmentation fund, \$35; and to different mission funds, \$70 95. Miss Potter, secretary of the Y. P. S. C. E., reported a successful year's work by the society. The receipts were \$25 21, and the disbursements \$26 20.

The flower committee raised \$11 72 and spent \$11 62. One hundred and sixty bouquets were taken to the sick and two floral sprays sent to homes. Miss Jean McDermid is treasurer of the committee.

The choir leader, F. Fitzgerald, reported receipts \$48 08, and balance on hand \$14 55.

Messrs. W. Hunter, A. Scott and Geo. Harper were elected members of the board of managers for the three year term, and Mr. James Brooks for a two year term. The retiring members are: Messrs. D. Potter, Geo. Harper and W. Ball, by expiration of term, and Mr. J. S. Saunders was reappointed auditor.

The appointment of a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. J. Gardiner was left in the hands of the managers.

Inspector Bell reported that license fees for 1898 amounting to \$1,456 50 were collected.

The chairman and inspector will deal with tenders for 1,000 dog tags for this year.

A memorandum from the mayor's inaugural address re a shelter for the poor was laid over.

On Ald. Winnett's motion council will be recommended to advertise a reward of \$50 for information that will lead to the conviction of persons intentionally sending false alarms to the fire department.

The city engineer was asked for a report on the condition of the city's watering carts, and also a report as to the cost of erecting standpipes for filling the carts. It was thought the use of hose as at present was expensive.

CANADA'S COLONISTS

Preparations to Receive the Doukhobors—Quarantine Inspection.

Ottawa, Jan. 12.—Superintendent Pedey and W. J. White, of the immigration department, left yesterday for Montreal to make arrangements with the Canadian Pacific Railway for transportation for the Doukhobors from St. John, N. B. to Winnipeg. On Friday, Mr. J. A. Smart, deputy minister of the interior, and Mr. White will leave for Halifax. They will be accompanied by Mr. W. T. R. Preston, who commences his duties in the department by going to meet the Doukhobors. Mr. Preston will be engaged in immigration work in Britain. After the Doukhobors have undergone quarantine inspection by Dr. Montzambert and his officers at Halifax they will be taken on to St. John, if they have passed the quarantine all right. Mr. W. B. Scarth will be present with Dr. Montzambert. Prince Hillcock has already left for Halifax. The exact date of the arrival of the steamer is not known.
