The inland revenue returns for August, at London, were: spirits, ex-warehouse, \$5,861.12; malt, ex-warehouse, \$7,883.82; raw leaf, ex-warehouse, \$5,846.02; cigar, ex-factory, \$12,147.15; cigars, ex-warehouse, \$5,891.90; other revenue, \$9,12. Total, \$37,133.13.

Death of Journalist.

The news of the death of Mr. J. M. Attenborough, of the Manchester Guardian, one of the English journalists who visited London July 31, last, was heard with deep regret by many newspapermen and others who met him here. Mr. Attenborough died in Montreal after a very brief illness. The body is being shipped to England.

Cheap Power.

St. Thomas Times: The consideration of a committee of the council of a communication from a Montreal firm regarding the generation of electric power from gas engines, brought forth the pointed remark from City Engineer Bell that Niagara power was not in it with the gas engine scheme. With Chatham getting its power at \$21.50 per horsepower, and St. Thomas lighting and power costing three or four times this, the members of the committee felt the proposition was worth investigating. Ald. Meehan, however, thought the company should tackle the private companies first before trying to "bleed the city." The engineer was instructed to write the company for more particulars and to get names of companies using this means of producing power. It was stated that the McClary's, of London, are installing a plant.

ACCIDENT AT**THE LIGHTHOUSE**

Gas Buoy Explodes Injuring

Keepers Henry and Arthur

Cartier.

Chatham, Sept. 4.—A serious accident happened at 2:30 yesterday afternoon at the lighthouse at the mouth of the river, whereby Henry and Arthur Cartier, lighthouse-keepers, are suffering from severe burns about the face and hands.

About a week ago the gas buoy at the mouth of the river went out, and yesterday some new carbide was sent from the city for the purpose of re-charging the buoy. Henry and Arthur Cartier went out in the tug "Vic" to pour in the carbide, and while they were charging the buoy the accident happened. Contrary to their expectations and knowledge, the inside of the buoy was damp. Seven or eight cans of the carbide were poured in when several hundred pounds of the fluid exploded—ignited by the dampness inside the buoy.

Both men were standing on the buoy when the explosion occurred, and both were thrown a considerable distance. Arthur was pitched into the water through the force of the explosion, and Henry was thrown clear off the buoy and landed on the deck of the tug. Henry's arms and face were badly burned, while Arthur sustained severe burns on his face.

Dr. McCall, of Tilbury, was called and the wounds of the two men were dressed, and although they are suffering a great deal of pain, their injuries are not considered as serious as they might have been.

LONDON LIFE AGENTS

Have Enjoyable Convention and Outing at Niagara-on-the-Lake.

Representatives of the London Life to the number of about thirty took the boat at Toronto Friday morning last for Niagara-on-the-Lake, where the party were registered at the Queen's Royal. The weather conditions were superb, and together with the natural beauties of the Niagara district, made the trip one that will not soon be forgotten.

Sessions of the convention occupied Friday afternoon and evening and Saturday morning, and included addresses by J. C. Richter, general manager; Dr. A. Graham, medical referee; E. E. After the regular programme of the convention the historic spots along the Niagara River were visited, and by special permission the plant of one of the power companies was thoroughly inspected.

A very pleasant feature of the convention was the presentation by the agents present to Mr. T. B. Parkinson, superintendent of agencies, of a gold watch, in appreciation of his untiring efforts in their behalf.

The party returned to Toronto on Monday, many of them taking in the exhibition before returning home.
