FRANCE, Aug. 4.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—As "General Headquarters" is the brain of the army from which all orders emanate, so "The Base" is in a very large measure the heart, whence the blood circulates to the remotest parts of the body.

A visit to a base shows that it is something far bigger and more comprehensive than a camp; it is a district. Its centre is a town of size and importance; at town whose church spires and towers render it visible from a long distance, while its railways and street car lines present a busy seene during all hours of the day and night. There is a large civilian population, carrying on business as usual, though air-raids are frequent, and demolished houses are constant reminders of ever-present danger. The town hall has been badly damaged, and a shot hole from a longrange naval gun can be seen in the tower.

In the streets of the town, people of all five continents jostle each other. There are the French, civilian and military; there are British troops of all ranks and descriptions, even the khakiclad women of the auxillary army corps; there are Australians, Canadians, American, Belgians, Chinese, East Indians, and African negroes. The latter make excellent transport drivers, while the Chinese are employed on ordinary labor

PARIS, Aug. 8.—The Franco-British offensive southeast of Amiens has been expected for some time in well-informed quarters. The recent advances in Picardy and Flanders suggested that such a step was in order.

The axis of the manoeuve in the present attacks seems to the railway from Amiens to Ham, Tergnier and Laon.

The battle may develop great effect upon the struggle going on between the Vesle and the Aisne. Failure to obtain reinforcements to combat the Franco-British armies, it is believed here, may force the German crown prince to retreat behind the Aisne, possibly to the Chemin-des-Dames.

If the offensive from Montdidier to Albert is successful and the army of yon Marwitz is forced to retreat, the armies of yon Huder and yon Eben, which are located between Montdidier and Soissons, will be in danger of a compulsory retirement.

75,000,000 POUNDS OF BEEF EXPORTED BY GANADA IN YEAR

225,000,000 Pounds of Pork Brantford Youth Succumbs as Sent Abroad.

RESULT OF CONSERVATION

Economy Rules of the Food Board Are Bring Big Results.

OTTAWA, Aug. 8 .- In issuing an appeal for the continued conservation of wheat, meat, dairy products and sugar, the Canada Food Board says POLISH POPULATION individual food saving by Canadians has resulted in an increase in the export of beef of 75,000,000 pounds, or nearly 68 per cent, and a net increase of 225,000,000 pounds in the export of pork, or 571 per cent. A pre-war importation of 7,000,000 pounds of butter per annum has been changed into an annual export of 4,000,000 pounds, and it is estimated that Canada exported at least 25 to 30 per cent more wheat during the last twelve months than could have been exported had it not been for the efforts for conservation and organization of the country's food resources. Standardization of flour has resulted in a saving of 20,000 barrels of flour a month, and with other conservation measures and voluntary saving in homes the total savings has been 2,640,000 barrels of flour per annum, equivalent to 12,000,000 bushels of wheat.

We are saving enough meat to feed half a million soldiers. Restrictions in the use of sugar will save 100,000 tons a year.

AIRSHIP BAGS SUB NEATLY, COMPLETELY, "NOT A TRACE" LEFT

Signals With Wireless and Trawlers Do the Rest.

SNARED ON THE BOTTOM

When U-Boat's Crew Shows Preference for Death, All Is Over.

LONDON, July 14.—British Wireless Service.—A sea sport which has arisen out of the war-hunting German submarines by airship-is described in the with telling how the crew of the U-boat apparently preferred death to being

One of the crew of an airship spotted a submarine lying on the bed of the ocean, in fairly shallow water.

"The wireless sparked," reads the account in the Times, "and soon away on the horizon there appeared a little destroyer, followed far astern by four squat trawlers, all racing toward the spot above which the airship cruised around.

The Unsuspecting Quarry.

"The destroyer came up first, of course, and it was not long before, guided by wireless instructions, her guns were trained in readiness to greet the unsuspecting U-boat should it bob to the surface. It seemed ages to the impatient crew before the trawlers arrived, but things moved rapidly once they were at the scene of action, for they knew their job of old.

"Working in pairs they approached their victim from opposite directions, steaming toward each other. Between each pair a strong "sweep" was stretched and allowed to hang in a huge loop that it might traverse the seabed. The vessels met and crossed each other's tracks immediately above the doomed craft. The 'sweeps' of either pair engaged the U-boat for and aft simultaneously, and held her in a gigantic cradle.

Enmeshed Like a Fish.


