Berlin's Reply, It Is Reported, Will Point Out Objections to

Basel. Oct. 17.—President Wilson's reply to the German note has created a new state of affairs in diplomatic discussions relative to peace, it is reported here from German sources, and the reply, it is said, will make it clearly understood that the tone employed by the president was open to objections.

There have been passionate discussions of the president's reply at meetson of the president's reply at meetson of the president's reply at meetson.

Insert of the president's reply at meetings of groups of the Reichstag, but no line of policy has been determined, although there has been prolonged dethough there has been prolonged defiberations on the subject. The president of Field Marshal von Hindenburg in Berlin is believed to foreshadow the drafting of the German reply to Mr. Wilson. Under the circumstances it is uncertain whether the Reichstag will meet tomorrow. In any case there will be no plenary meeting of the Parliament before the reply is forwarded. Then there will be a full-dress debate, in which Socialists, notably Friederich Ebert, vice-president of the Social Democratic party, and Gustav Noske. Socialist member of the Reichstag, will take part.

Great disorder ensued in the Chamber. When the sitting was resumed, after a brief postponement, a draft of the address to the king was read. It said the result of the war had been such as to place the throne in danger. It stated that Hungary must have full autonomy. "Hungary feels herself to be in full accord with the ideas spreading throughout the world along the lines of the noble principles of President Wilson's address." The address continued: "Hungary must be completely independent, must have general electoral suffrage, and the relations between nationalities in the country must be governed by the principles enunciated by President Wilson. Hungary is in danger of invasion. Hungarian troops must be brought back and the relations between nationalities in the country must be governed by the principles enunciated by President Wilson. In point of activity and scope, the movement rivalled the many war sesmovement rivalled the many sions of the stock exchange in 1915 and

Sales during the first hour aggregated almost 500,000 shares, or on the basis of over 2,500,000 shares for the day. Advances in those stocks which, it is considered, would benefit by a declaration of peace, ranged from two to ten points. The public as well as professional interests were buyers.

C'lls were the chief beneficiaries, amounting to new maximums at advances of between two and ten points, while metals, next in favor, recorded gains of one to three points. Rails moved upward one to three points. The market seethed with activity during the morning, the first hour's turn-over approaching 500,000 shares. Selling for profits and a four-point decline in Marine, preferred, provoked reactions of one to three points from highest levels, U. S. Steel also forfeiting most of its gain of 1%. Leaders in the war group, mainly Bethlehem and Crucible Steel and Baldwin Locomotive yielded one to two points. Included among the gains of the morning were motors and utilities at advances of one to four points. Recoveries in Marines and United States Steel and new high records for oils, with royal Dutch rising 16 points, imparted fresh strength to the market at noon
