

COMRADE FRENCH ASKED TO REMAIN HEAD OF G. A. U. V.

Enlisted As "Luck"—To Pro-
test Export of Hydro
Power.

WANT HOLIDAY NOV. 11

Deputation Will Ask 1920
Council To Raise Tax
Exemption Limit.

Considerable comment has been in circulation during the past two weeks to the effect that Comrade French, president of the local post of the Grand Army of United Veterans, was not the man wanted by the association for the position of president. At the meeting last evening, Comrade French offered to resign, but a standing vote was taken, which was unanimous that Comrade French continue to hold the position.

"The only reason why some of the members do not want Comrade French in the chair is because he is a commissioned officer," said one of the members. "Comrade French enlisted as a buck private and went to South Africa and won promotion on the field. In the late war he again enlisted as a private with the P.C.L.I., and won his present rank of colonel on the field, fighting beside the rest of us. What better man and having the record that Comrade French has, do we want for our president? Fellows that do this have not the record Comrade French has, and those kind are always the ruin of any club," concluded the speaker.

Want a Holiday? They were discussed and a resolution was passed giving power to Secretary Lavender to write to the secretary of the Central Veterans' Council, asking them to appoint a committee to approach Mayor

Little and the city council to ask them to proclaim November 11 a public holiday.

Secretary Lavender brought the matter up regarding the shortage of hydro power in the city, of which he was a victim last evening and more expected delayed several minutes. Permission was given him to write the head of the hydro commission, protesting vigorously against the cities in the United States using the hydro that should be coming to Canadians. He will also write the secretaries of the Great War Veterans, the Army and Navy Veterans and the Central Veterans' Council, asking them to voice strong protests against the States getting the power.

A deputation will be sent to next year's city council, asking them to raise the tax exemption for the soldiers in the city to \$4,000 instead of \$3,000. Judging from the interest shown when this conclusion was arrived at, all members of the post were willing to stand behind the deputation asking for this grant.

The political program that the Grand Army of United Veterans will take up at the next Dominion election was read.

Comrades McDonald and Swindle were elected as auditors for the coming year. Several new members were admitted to the post of the local post of the Grand Army of United Veterans at the next meeting, owing to the fact that there is a membership drive under way.

FIRST SNOWFALL

Great White Flakes Seen in City on
Friday Afternoon.

London saw the first fall of the "white stuff" Friday afternoon, when for more than an hour great white flakes of snow fell. The temperature fell considerably during the day, the high mark being 41 degrees Fahrenheit, and the lowest 29 degrees. Although several weeks ago points in Western Ontario reported a fall of snow, London was not so favored until yesterday.

LABOR DECIDES TO ENTER CANDIDATES WITHIN FORTNIGHT

Will Ask Locals To Send
Representatives To Con-
sider Municipal Situa-
tion.

KNOCK HYDRO CONTROL

To Get Accurate Reports On
Coal Price, Monthly,
Resolved.

Decision to enter the municipal political field within the next two weeks was made by the Labor representation committee last night. Representatives of all locals connected with the organization will be asked to attend a meeting Friday, November 12, to discuss the situation.

The power situation was discussed, and the one-man control of the hydro system outlined by Judge Barron was condemned. No resolution was passed.

All locals were asked to press for the publication by the Government of monthly returns on the cost of coal delivered at local sidings.

The election question was raised by the secretary, William Tite. He said that Mayor Little is his candidate for the mayoralty last year had said the citizens should decide a public improvement by ballot but that at the last meeting of No. 2 committee of the council he had urged that an expenditure of \$175,000 for storm sewers be placed in the London bill without a vote. The mayor also pressed for spending \$58,000 in sanitary sewers without a vote. "Several other items will be brought up before November 12 by this same democratic committee, who wish to force taxes on the people willy-nilly, and it is up to us to take action," said Mr. Tite.

Delegato J. F. Thompson said the quickest way to do it was to call a special meeting for action in regard to the election, and the delegates to the council of the city council. The majority of them are opposed to labor, he charged.

Ald. John Ashton said that sanitary sewers did not require a vote of the people in the London bill. No plans were being built, he said, and the sewerage would be at a standstill in this regard if a bylaw was submitted and turned down.

Mayor Little was not wholly responsible, as he had only been present at the latter part of the meeting.

Johnson's article on the power situation was warmly commended by one delegate. Although there was an acute power shortage, the hydro power was talking of expanding. The hydro shop was lit up brilliantly at night and the people were being urged to buy electrical appliances. The proposed shut-down of factories for one hour a day was unfair in his opinion.

Develop Resources.

W. G. Tite thought the country should develop its coal resources to a greater extent and relieve the situation in this way.

E. W. Hawkins advised against protesting the export of power to the United States, as this might involve many complications. He thought the trouble was due to the fact that steam plants which might have served as hydro activities to obtain new customers, Labor was supporting the hydro system as a public ownership project, and it was up to them to see that it was run democratically and not become a one-man project, he said.

J. F. Thompson suggested the creation of accumulators to store the surplus power at night for use in the day time. E. B. Adams also advised against protesting the export of power, as he said the United States would retaliate by refusing to export coal to Canada.

It was finally decided to take no action on the question.

Varying coal prices in the city were reported by the delegates, and it was alleged that Toronto prices were much lower than here. Mr. Ashton thought the best way to deal effectively with the matter was to get accurate government reports on the prices monthly, and his resolution to this effect was adopted.

Some members of the committee were not in favor of making the appointments in the middle of the term, but Inspector G. B. Edwards said it was most necessary that they be appointed immediately, as there were thirteen classes which were not taught these two subjects.

After the reading of applications, Miss Grace B. Graham of Rodney and Robert Hartley of Seaford were appointed. Of the applicants these two were the most experienced. Mrs. Edwards said that should fully-qualified London teachers apply for such positions they should be given the preference over applicants from other cities. Chairman T. Coleridge presided.

CONSULT EDUCATION

DEPT. RE NEW HIGH
SCHOOL IS DECISION

Plan To Build On Beck Pro-
perty Ardently Opposed
by Trustee.

NO SEPARATE SCHOOL

Dr. Tiltmann Knows Nothing
of Proposal—\$75,000
"Headley" Price.

The collegiate institute committee of the board of education recommended to the department of education be consulted again in regard to the location of a new school, and that the construction of which plans have been prepared.

Trustee Edwin Smith ardently opposed the proposal to build the new school on the property of Sir Adam Beck on Ritchie street north of known as "Headley." Some of the separate school pupils had already stopped going to the commercial department of the collegiate institute, he said, and he understood that it might not be long before the trustees would build a separate high school for Roman Catholic school supporters.

Trustee Smith, with quite evident frankness, declared that he knew nothing about the proposal to build a separate high school. Mr. McElhenry pointed out that there was a department of education regulations for the maintenance of a separate high school, and that the trustees would have to be passed to authorize it. He is entirely new to me," said Dr. Tiltmann.

Private School.

Somewhere pointed out to Trustee Smith that if any new secondary school was planned by the Roman Catholics in London, it would be the nature of a private school, and Dr. Tiltmann observed that Roman Catholic students in such an event would exercise their own judgment just as they do at present, whether they attended the collegiate institute or the collegiate institute.

Mr. Smith happened to refer to the proposal to change the site, and the scheme to build the new collegiate institute on the Beck property. Trustee Rowe protested against this insinuation quite warmly, and wanted Mr. Smith to understand that the board was not promoting the scheme any more than any other trustees who had at heart the interests of secondary education in the city of London.

Mrs. A. T. Edwards here declared that it was she who had first suggested the proposal to change the site, and Sir Adam Beck had asked her to suggest a figure which she thought would be fair for the purchase of the property. Sir Adam had promised to let the board of education know the price, and she had heartily agreed to purchase it at this figure, before it would be sold to any other purchaser.

Trustee (Mrs.) Ronald Harris raised the question whether it was definitely decided to have a central high school.
