NEW YORK, June 19.-Ballot, a sturdy our-year-old son of Voter, to-day at epshead Bay, carried the colors of ase by two and a half lengths and witheven to give him a hard drive. Struggling gamely forward at the finish came John E. Madden's three-year-old colt, King James, hard driven with whip and heel, by Guy Hurns, five lengths before Fair Play, the pride of August Belmont's stable. Master Robert was fourth and the remainder of the field of 12 was wel strung oue. The time for a mile and a quarter was 2.03, being one-fifth of a second slower than the world's record for the distance, made by Broomstick at Brighton Beach, July 9, 1904. Broomstick was three years old and carried 104 pounds. Ballot's impost was 127 pounds. After the race, Mr. Keene, while watching his horse cool out, was the recipient of numerous congratulations for the first winning of the historic race. "He's a grand colt, is Ballot, and he iran a remarkable race," said Harry Payne Whitney to Mr. Keene. "Yes, he is," replied the venerable vice-chairman of the Jockey Club, "and Notter gave him a brilliant ride.
