

FUNERAL SET FOR MAY 20

The body of the late monarch will be borne on a gun carriage thru the streets of London to Paddington Station and again thru the streets of Windsor to the castle. The procession will be sim-ilar to that upon the occasion of the funeral of Queen Victoria in 1901. King Will Ride Behind Casket.' Above the casket will be placed the royal insignia, the crown. orb and sceptre. King George, mounted, will ride immediately behind the casket, followed by other male members of the royal family, foreign monarchs and special ambassadors. The Queen, Quen Mother and ladies of the royal family will come next in carriages.


