

VICTIMS OF EXPLOSION INCREASED TO ELEVEN

Public Funeral Wednesday—Public Service For King on Parliament Hill.

OTTAWA, May 9.—(Special.)—The number of victims of the explosion in the factory of the General Explosives Co., Hull, on Sunday evening was increased to 11 to-night by the death of Water-street Hospital of Patrick Blanchfield of Wrightville. Blanchfield, who was an old man, sustained a double fracture of the skull and his condition was regarded as hopeless from the first. The Hull City Council in session to-night decided that the public funeral of the victims would take place on Wednesday morning, and authorized the start of a relief fund. The inquest on the bodies was adjourned till Tuesday.

The following telegram was received by his excellency the governor-general this evening from Lord Crewe, colonial secretary: "Your telegram, May 8, has been laid before his majesty, who has commanded me to state that he is deeply touched by the warm sympathy of the governor-general, ministers and people of the Dominion of Canada. The loyalty and affection of his majesty's subjects of the King's dominion beyond the seas are a source of great consolation to his majesty and to the royal family in their sad bereavement."

In addition to the services at the respective churches there will be a public one on Parliament Hill one hour before the state funeral. At this memorial service on Parliament Hill it is expected that the entire Government House party, all the military corps in this district and thousands of citizens will fill the spacious square. An immense massed choir will sing "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er" and combined bands will play "The Dead March in Saul."

Brantford's Message.
BRANTFORD, May 9.—(Special.)—At a special meeting of the city council to-night arrangements were made for a memorial service for King Edward in the armories on the afternoon of the funeral. The following resolution was telegraphed to Earl Grey: "The citizens of Brantford, Canada, unitedly deplore the death of one of the most beloved and most popular rulers Great Britain has had; one who embodied the best features of the Victorian reign, and who, while adhering to his promise to govern strictly in accordance with the constitution, did much by his personality to promote harmony and progress within the empire, and maintain universal peace. All Canada believes he did his full duty."

Elaborate Ceremony at St. John's.
ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 9.—Elaborate ceremonies proclaiming George V. as King made an imposing spectacle at noon to-day. Escorted by a guard of honor made up of coats and blue jackets, Sir Ralph Champney Williams, K.C.M.G., Governor of Newfoundland, proceeded to the legislative hall, where were assembled both branches of the legislature, members of the cabinet, foreign consuls, high dignitaries of the church and judiciary, and many citizens.

FUNERAL SET FOR MAY 20 WILL BE A GREAT PAGEANT

50,000 Troops Will Line Route and Half a Dozen European Monarchs Will Be in the Cortège.

LONDON, May 9.—The proclamation announcing the accession of King George V. was read at St. James Palace this morning. Friday, May 20, has been definitely fixed as the date for King Edward's funeral. The body will be removed on the 17th from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Hall, where it will lie in state for three days, thence being taken on the evening of the third day to Windsor, for interment in St. George's Chapel on the day following.

The body of the late monarch will be borne on a gun carriage thru the streets of London to Paddington Station and again thru the streets of Windsor to the castle. The procession will be similar to that upon the occasion of the funeral of Queen Victoria in 1901.

King Will Ride Behind Casket.
Above the casket will be placed the royal insignia, the crown, orb and sceptre. King George, mounted, will ride immediately behind the casket, followed by other male members of the royal family, foreign monarchs and special ambassadors. The Queen, Queen Mother and ladies of the royal family will come next in carriages. The rest of the cortège will be made up of representatives of the army and navy, members of the imperial household and high officers of state.

The Republic of France probably will be represented at the funeral by former President Loubet, although there is talk that President Fallières may come. Emperor William will be here, as will also the Kings of Greece, Spain, Portugal, Denmark, Norway, Belgium, and Bulgaria, and the heirs to the throne of Austria, Italy, Turkey, Sweden and Roumania.

Prince Fushimi, who is already in London, will represent Japan. Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch, younger brother of Emperor Nicholas, will represent Russia, while Holland's representative will be Prince Henry.

Many difficult points of precedent will have to be solved by those in charge of the funeral cortège and the presence of Europe's rulers will require the most delicate management to prevent slight. It was announced this afternoon that George V. and Queen Mary would greet King Haakon and Queen Maud of Norway on their arrival this evening, taking them to Buckingham Palace.

The funeral procession of Edward will, according to the plans made public to-day, be one of the most impressive pageants of modern history, outlasting in splendor that of his mother, Victoria. Fifty thousand troops will line the streets, shoulder to shoulder, with arms reversed. The actual military escort of the body will consist of 2500 picked men selected from 40 regiments.

The infantry will head the procession and then will come the cavalry, followed by the artillery and brought up by sailors and marines. Every branch of both services will be represented by the crack men of crack regiments.

It was officially announced at Buckingham Palace at noon that the Queen mother, Alexandra, was well and bearing up bravely. This morning rumors were current that in a paroxysm of

CIRCULATE PURE LITERATURE
To Offset the Vice—Tract Society's Work Commenced.

At the 7th annual meeting of the Upper Canada Religious Tract and Book Society, the following resolution, moved by Rev. A. Robertson, D.D., and seconded by Rev. W. J. McKay, L.L.D., was passed:

"That in view of the determined and persistent effort to circulate impure literature, as evidenced by recent convictions in our courts, the work of the tract society be specially commended to the support of all Christian people as one of the best means of overcoming this great evil, and that renewed efforts be put forth to save our land from this curse by increasing the spread of pure literature, which inspires and ennobles character."

Addresses were delivered by Rev. W. H. Hickey, D.D., and J. S. Potter, superintendent of sailors' work. Rev. Dr. John Neill, who was one of the committee who examined the literature for which King and Skill were convicted in the sessions for circulating said that he could not believe that such vile stuff was ever published.

According to the treasurer's report the receipts for the year amount to \$79,650.46, including a balance at the beginning of last year of \$504.73. The balance on hand at the beginning of this year amounted to \$4875.30.
