JUVENILE COURT WORK REVIEWED Commissioner Boyd Submits

Annual Report to Board of Control.

A comprehensive report of the work of the juvenile court during the year 1916 was submitted to the board of control yesterday by Commissioner Boyd. Dur-ing the year a total of 1266 cases had been handled, or an average of four a day. The number of children dealt with was 2443 and the number in court more than once was 242. 


