At Prince William and vicinity I experienced the most generous attention of the Rev. Wm. Ross. I addressed three meetings in his extensive parish, and I hope to see another large contribution from our new friends there.

I paid two visits to Sheffield and was the recipient of much kindness from some of the friends of that most loyal and liberal Branch. At Gagetown the meeting was small

but very encouraging.

Very few came to the meeting at Wickham, but there were good assemblies at Ferusalem and Hampstead. At the latter place our Society has lost a good friend by the death of Mr. Albert Palmer, who was for many years its devoted Secretary.

At Douglas Harbour the meeting was good and the

speeches of our friends there as usual excellent.

I held two meetings at Cambridge Branch, where I was kindly entertained as usual and conveyed from place to place by my old friends.
