**Brokers Building Up Reserves** and Brokers in Hard Luck--Stock Market Weak.

(Montreal Witness, Friday.) fact, is noticed here in even a more agravated form than elsewhere. Money in New York does make a somewhat, artificial display of cheapness, with its call rates quoted at around two per cent and in the early part of the week, at less than that price, but there is nothing but a continuous stringent tone reported daily on the money market at this point. Brokers cannot yet tap the coffers of the banks, despite the most earnest desire to do so. 


