### S.S. HAMPSTEAD HAS BAD LUCK

**She Met With Another Accident on Her Way Down River Yesterday.**

The steamer Hampstead, which was sunk recently at Gagetown, and had just returned to her route after repairs, was brought to Indiantown this morning as the result of another mishap. When near Upper Gagetown wharf on her way down river yesterday, something went wrong with the steering gear. She came down today under her own steam as far as South Bay, where the tug W. H. Murray met her. The steamer will be taken through the falls this afternoon for repairs. It is believed that the trouble is nothing more serious than the unshipping of the rudder; and it is thought that she will be ready to return to Gagetown tomorrow evening.

### THE NEPISIGUIT LUMBER COMPANY

Interesting Account of Its Formation Published in an American Paper.

The Springfield, Mass., correspondent of The Lumberman's Review has a very interesting account of the formation of the Nepequiguit Lumber Company at Bathurst on April 21st. The new company is incorporated with a capital of \$100,000. The officers are: R. H. W. Lowe, president; Charles D. Ordway, Burlington, Vt., vice-president; Fred S. Morse, Springfield, treasurer; A. W. MacRae, St. John (N.B.), secretary, and those with Walter P. Dodge, Edward O. Sutton and Samuel M. Green, of Springfield, and William G. White of Bathurst (N.B.), will constitute the board of directors.

The new organization has taken over the timber limits of at least the right to cut all the cedar from 318,000 acres, formerly in the hands of the O. F. Stacy Company, of Bathurst. The transfer includes all the plant of the Stacy mill and all lumber camps, etc., as well as a second mill at Negadoc. The product of those mills (which have been modernized) will be sold in the New England and Middle States, being shipped over the I. C. R.

The Lumberman's Review referring to Mr. Morse, who is head of the Fred S. Morse Lumber Company of Springfield, says he is the leading spirit of the new company and a man who enjoys the confidence of business men everywhere. He was born in 1866. He has been through every phase of lumber work from tally boy and inspector up to his present position.

The advent of an energetic man like Mr. Morse into the lumbering business at Bathurst should have a good effect on the industry in that section.
