Lawrence H. Hoke, appointed vice-American consul here, arrived on today's Boston train, and at once reported at the American consulate for duty. Mr. Hoke, who is a Virginian, was previously stationed at Parramore, N. S., as consular agent. He comes here from Washington.

Alexander Worme, who was associated with the late A. W. Vanwart for twenty one years in the livery stable business in the north end, and who has been carrying on the business himself for the past seven years, has decided to retire. His friends will be sorry, especially those who boarded their horses at his stables.

Donaldson line steamship Almora, Captain Whimster, arrived in port on Sunday from Glasgow direct, with a large general cargo, among which were 26,285 bags of Scotch hard coal, 205 tons in bulk and 392 tons of soft coal; also 2000 bags of sugar. The steamer had a fine passage. After discharging the Almora will proceed to Baltimore.

Thinking possibly that there were some people in the city who have never gazed upon her graceful lines, the ferry steamer Ottagandy, which the common council has decided to sell at auction, has been placed on exhibition in Wiggins' Slip. It will be sold and the terms of sale have not yet been drawn up. A suggestion has been made that the steamer might prove an attraction if sent to New York to take part in the Hudson-Fulton celebration, along with other notable craft.

A meeting of the Father Matthew Association is to be held this evening in St. Malachi's Hall and as large an attendance as possible is requested. At last week's meeting a committee was appointed to select from the association as a whole, a number of members who would be willing to run for election if none called, and a report will be received this evening. FIRST HAVANA STEAMER IS IN

NO MORE LILY LAKE FISHING THIS YEAR

The fishing season at Lily Lake, Rockwood Park, closed today. The season is reported as not so good as last year, less fish having been taken out. This is accounted for in a large measure by the fact that the water has been quite low, with a considerable growth of weeds. The fish, apparently, are not hungry, as a number of large fish have been seen, but do not take to the fly. Frank White, president of the White Catering Co., said today that the lake was filled with small fish and he felt sure that in the course of a couple of years it would be a splendid fishing ground. The season opened in July.

HAPPY DAYS ARE ABOUT ENDED AT MILLIDGEVILLE

Sunday saw the last general R. K. Y. C. outing on the River—Think Now of Winter Plans

Millidgeville is soon to lose the gay appearance which it has presented so pleasantly to the eye all during the summer. The attractive spectacle of the many boats lying at anchor in the pretty little harbor and the familiar scenes of the R. K. Y. C. boys floating about clad in their white ducks are soon to be a thing of the past for this season. Yesterday was regarded by many as the last general outing day of this year. Practically all the sail yachts and a number of the gasoline craft of the fleet were on the river yesterday. A finer day could hardly have been desired.

At times there was barely enough wind to fill the sails, a fact which occasioned much regret from the yachtmasters, but a fairly stiff breeze was in evidence most of the day. The yachts were up and away at twilight, were called upon to render aid to their white-winged brethren in bringing them into port.

The Corinthia, Commodore Thomson's new flagship, made her debut on the river yesterday, an event which called for hearty cheers from the boys as she steamed majestically by. Each yacht dipped its ensign three times a silent salute in her honor.

The new yacht is generally conceded to be a better one both in appearance and speed than the Sphinx. It was the intention of the majority of the members of the fleet to accept Commodore Thomson's invitation to "come aboard," at Millidgeville, but many of the yachts were up river when she left her moorings in the harbor and proceeded to Rothesay. An informal reception was held on board before she did so, however, and praise and admiration were everywhere heard as the guests inspected the saloon, decks, cabin machinery and other parts of the new boat, and found each to have exceeded expectations.

Already the R. K. Y. C. boys, though with regret, are making preparations for the winter season. In the course of a week or two almost all the boats will have taken passage on the yard railway and been placed on the blocks for their annual summer vacation. A number of the boats are now in the club yard, among them being the Iris, Pickwick and Winogene. A few more are expected to be hauled out this week and the rest will follow in short order before the present month has rolled by.

Between thirty-five and fifty yachts will be accommodated on the blocks this winter. Some of the larger craft will be taken below the falls and placed in some of the bays along the harbor front, until the balmy breezes of summer warrant their reappearance in the waters of Millidgeville harbor. Among the yachts to be placed on the docks below the falls are the Windward and Dahinda, the schooner yachts of the fleet.

It is hoped that those members who are not intending to sail their boats again this year will have them hauled out at the earliest possible moment, as there is generally a busy rush for space on the clubhouse blocks at the closing of the season.

There are now twenty-two cases of typhoid fever reported in the hospital. Some are cases that originated outside the city but the majority are local cases. Many of the cases at the hospital had been there for some weeks as the disease was one from which the patients did not recover very rapidly.
