JAPS ARE 74 MILES NORTH OF THE PASS.

Russia Fears That the Pastoral Address Will Incite the Peasantry to Bloody Deeds--Admiral Rojestvensky Does Not Know Where He Is at--Gorky Goes South.

St. Petersburg, Mar. 30--A telegram from Sitka, Manchuria, under date of Feb. 28, says--The Chinese report that a Japanese icebound, which is probably carrying out a flanking movement, has been seen twenty-seven miles northeast of Sitka (74 miles north of The Pass). Snow has fallen heavily here.

The Russian Fleet. Paris, Mar. 30--1:20 p. m.--Admiral Rojestvensky, in the course of an authorized interview with a Matin correspondent at the Islands of Nossi Be, near Madagascar, March 4, said the future movements of the squadron depended on the arrival of coal and military developments, adding: "The slow arrival of coals becomes a serious question when fleet consists of sixty warships. If coal is abundant, I may go to meet the third division."

Gorky Goes South. St. Petersburg, March 30--The report that Maxim Gorky, who is awaiting trial at Riga, on the charges of sedition and treason would be allowed to go to the Crimea to recuperate is correct. Owing to the condition of his health, Gorky has been granted the necessary permission to go to the south of Russia. He has had several hemorrhages. Gorky has been completing a drama entitled "The Children of the Sun." His trial has been fixed for June 7.

Incendiary Fire. St. Petersburg, Mar. 30--The disilling department of the Shukoff oil works was destroyed yesterday by fire which is believed to have been incendiary in origin. The damage is estimated at \$250,000.

Footing the People. Moghly, Russia, Mar. 30--Proclamation have been issued in broad-cast here calling upon the people to support the war in order to escape a second Mongolian yoke. The Japanese being described as being worse than the locusts of Egypt. It is added that once they establish themselves in Asia, they will not only possess Manchuria and Korea, but will swarm over and drive out the Russians from Siberia.

Revolution Feared. St. Petersburg, March 30--1:30 p. m.--In view of the peasant agitation throughout the country some of the newspapers are seriously alarmed at the prospect of a revolution. The metropolitan of St. Petersburg, M. Antonius, as being a direct incitement to the ignorant peasants to begin a war of extermination against the entire educated class, and the papers are demanding that the metropolitan and the Holy Synod, whose multiplicity, it is assumed, Antonius was, take immediate measures to quaternact, the effect of his statements.

Very Little Damage Reported From Freshets Thus Far. Montreal, Mar. 30--(Special)--Reports which come to the city from the province indicate that floods are doing little damage this year.

Very Little Peace Talk. Berlin, Mar. 30--The suggestion that an international congress might be called to arrange the Russian-Japanese terms of peace finds no favor at the foreign office here, where a full settlement between the belligerents is much preferred.

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MUNICIPAL TELEPHONES. Testimony in Their Favor Given at Ottawa Today.

Ottawa, March 30--(Special)--At the special committee on telephones today, A. Cameron, Beaverton, was examined by Sir Wm. Mulock. He said that eleven miles of telephone of the independent telephone company of Beaverton, cost \$1,600. This paid for everything. At the end of eight months, the line was sold to the Bell telephone company. It was a rural line, in the interests of the farmers. The original partners were Jarnes. The Bell Telephone Company refused to give the service at less than \$80 a subscriber. After the system was sold out, the price was raised to \$15 to \$20. This was too high.

Big Fire in Reformatory. The loss is \$75,000 but there were no fatalities. Elmira, N. Y., Mar. 30--The fire in the Elmira Reformatory at midnight last night totally destroyed the tail or shop, storerooms, laundry, bath room, number one engine room, shoe shop, book-binding, upholstery, blacksmith-shop, photograph gallery and broom shop, and entailed a loss to the amount of about \$75,000. The fire started in the clothing storeroom, but its origin is unknown.
