BIG BUSINESS MEN HELPING ENGLAND IN WAR

Giants of Commerce Working To Defeat Germans

From All Over World

A Bonar Law recently astonished peo-ple in the Old Country by his statements as to the number of business men now ple in the Old Country by his statements as to the number of business men now assisting the British government. He claimed for the ministry of munitions, for instance, that it comprised "a body of business men more competent, I believe, than is to be found in any industrial undertaking in this country."
