WILL REGULATE TAXI SERVICE IN LANCASTER

Highway Board To Consult Atty.-Gen.—Conference Before Framing By-Law

The matter of regulation of taxi services in the Parish of Lancaster was the principal item of business before the Highway Board at its monthly meeting last evening.

The Highway Board has in mind particularly conditions on the Sand Cove Road during the summer months, when a number of taxis are plying for hire. They expect to pass a by-law calling for a license fee for operators of taxi-cabs and setting forth conditions under which they may operate.

It was decided to have a conference with Hon. J. E. Baxter, K. C., as Attorney-General, to determine the limit of the powers of the board before framing the by-law and this will be arranged for an early date.
