

## HEALTH RECORD OF CITY IS GOOD

Large Reduction Shown in  
Number of Contagious  
Disease Cases

Milk Reports and Other Matters  
at Board Meeting—Death  
List Smaller.

The cases of notifiable diseases reported to the Saint John sub-division Board of Health in the ten months ended Aug. 31, 1925, was less than half of the number reported in the corresponding ten months' period of the previous year, according to the table prepared by the secretary of the board, T. M. Burns, and presented at a meeting yesterday.

The total drop in the ten months was 800 cases.

### REFUSE LICENSE

An application for a license to install a pasteurization plant within the territory of the sub-division Board of Health was received and it was decided that no further license for pasteurization plants would be granted until May of next year. There are at present three pasteurization plants in the city and two in the county. The Board ordered a lower flat in a city house to be closed unless suitable repairs were made.

John Kelly, chairman, presided at the meeting and the routine reports which were submitted were satisfactory.

Dr. T. Fred Johnston, dairy and food inspector reported taking 538 samples of the city milk and finding a very good record. During the month he had had four of the eight gallon cans of milk sent to the city dumped in the sewer as unfit for human consumption, and there had been some shortage of milk supply during the strike by the producers. All inspections of slaughterhouses, milk plants and milk producers' premises showed satisfactory conditions.

### ANTI-T. B. REPORT.

The report of anti-tuberculosis work showed 385 cases had been under care during the month, 21 being new and 8 old cases readmitted. There were 17 discharged on whom seven were non-tubercular and one had died. The

## BERMUDA READY TO DO MORE BUSINESS

Alexander Wilson, Home From  
Indies, Speaks of Need of In-  
creased Transportation.

Both business men and government officials of Bermuda are anxious to do anything that might lead up to better and enlarged trade relations with Canada, declared Alexander Wilson, of the Wilson Box & Lumber Co., Ltd., on his return yesterday from a business trip to that island and the West Indies.

Mr. Wilson said his visit to the several islands had been very enjoyable and from a business standpoint most successful. Bermuda, he said, had been enjoying a splendid tourist travel even during what is known as its off-season, and there was some talk of opening up the large hotels which ordinarily operate only during the winter months.

"From a business standpoint," continued Mr. Wilson, "while most of the islands have had their setbacks during the past few years owing to one cause or another, there seems to permeate all classes a hopefulness almost amounting to a certainty that better times are ahead. In this connection it seemed to be the unanimous opinion that if improved transportation arrangements were made, as now seemed assured under the new Canada-West Indies agreement, business between the two countries would be greatly increased."

Mr. Wilson found the inhabitants of the islands most loyal to the British Crown and very anxious to cultivate closer trade relations with Canada. They also expressed a desire to see more Canadian business men make the trip to the islands.

## N. S. BOY HELD FOR SLAYING OF YOUNG PLAYMATE

Guysboro Jurors Declare  
They Cannot Exonerate  
Philip Clyke

MATTER IS REFERRED  
TO ATTORNEY GENERAL

Fires Shotgun at Other,  
Blows Off Back of Head,  
Causing Death

GUYSBORO, N. S., Oct. 5—Earl Skinner, aged 10, was shot dead by Philip Clyke, a playmate, in the latter's home near here, on Saturday afternoon.

At the inquest held here this afternoon into the boy's death, evidence was produced that showed that Earl Skinner and his brother Wilfrid were with Philip Clyke at the Clyke home when Philip got possession of a shotgun belonging to the house and after snapping it out of the door a couple of times, turned around and fired at Earl Skinner, blowing the back of his head off and killing him almost instantly.

JURY WON'T CLEAR HIM.  
At the conclusion of the evidence the jury brought in the following verdict: "We find that the deceased, Earl Skinner, son of John Skinner, came to his death in the afternoon of the third day of October, 1925, at John Clyke's, near Guysboro, N. S., and that his death was caused by a shot from a gun in the hands of Philip Clyke. We cannot exonerate Philip Clyke, and we believe the evidence is sufficient to warrant putting him on trial for causing the death of Earl Skinner."

It is understood the facts of the case have been communicated to the Attorney-General's department and that further action will be taken in the matter.

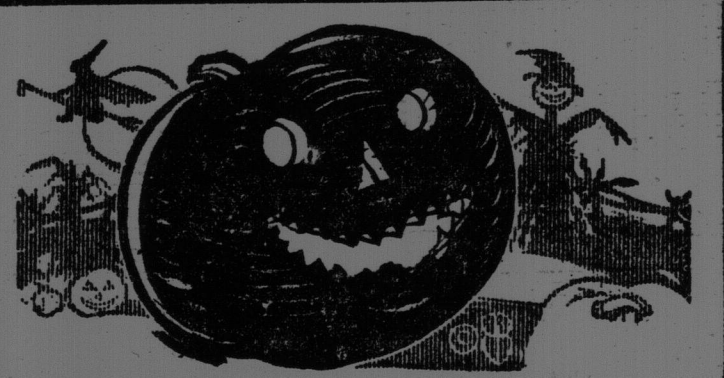

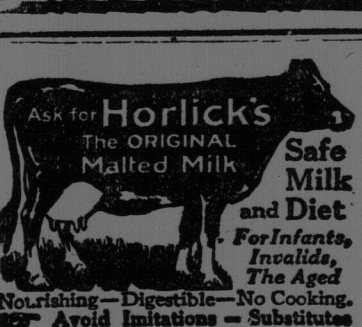

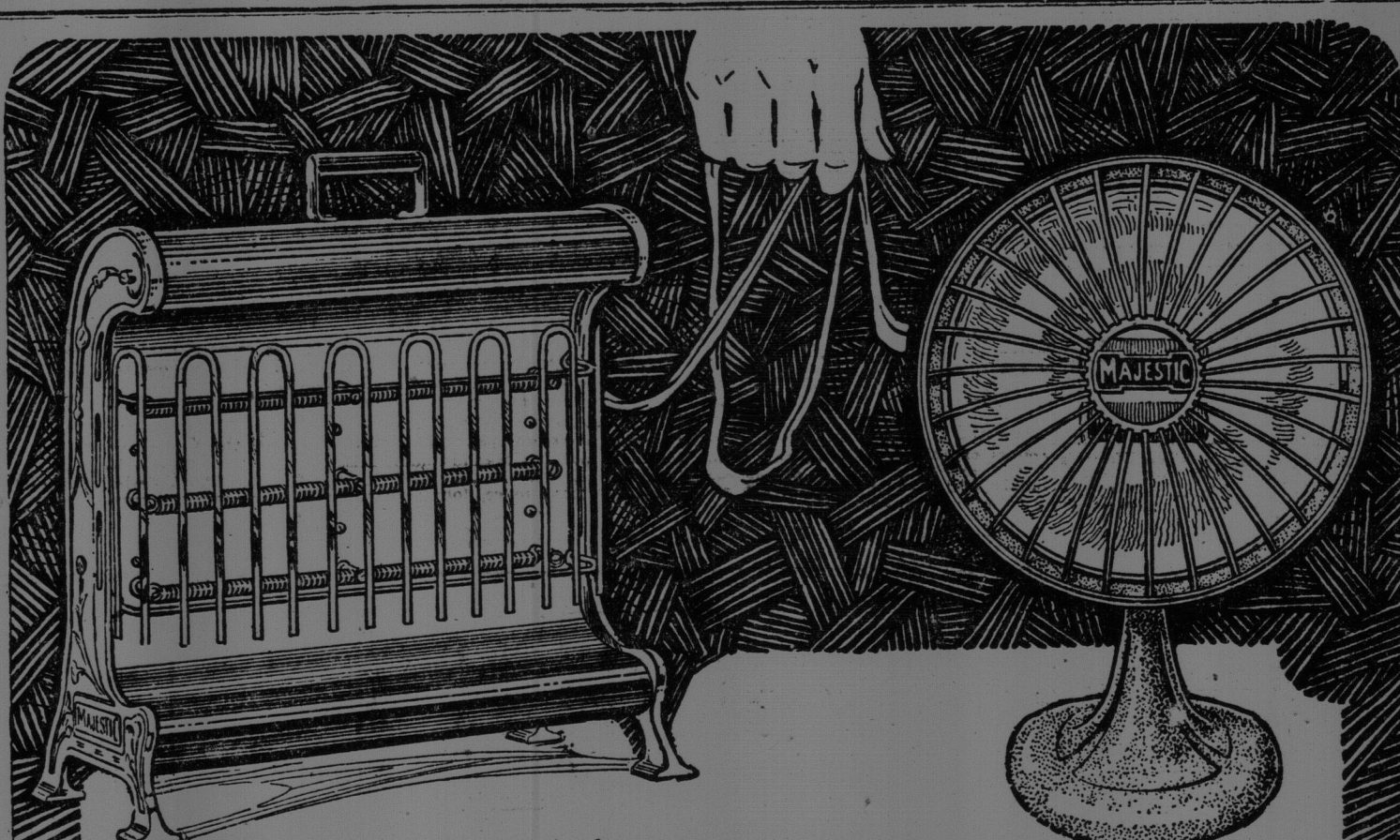
