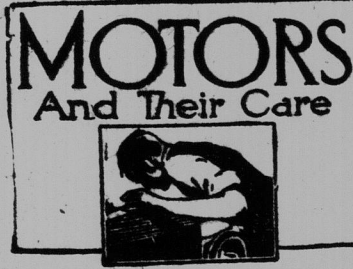

## MOTORS And Their Care

Practical Suggestions for  
Insuring the Longevity  
of the Car.

**To Prolong Life of Tires.**  
At the end of every 2,000 miles of service, a tire should be removed from the rim, deflated, and all soapstone and grit removed. The inside of the casing should be washed with clean gasoline and, after drying, should be dusted with talc. During this operation a close inspection should be made of the tread and the inside of the casing for any cuts or fragments of glass, or other foreign materials. The rim should be cleaned of all rust and paint. Rust on the rims leads to quick deterioration if it works its way through the flap.

**Important of Ample Lubrication.**  
Cylinders that are not properly lubricated will cause the pistons to expand and lock. The absence of sufficient lubrication permits the metal surface to come in direct contact. When this condition arises, the damaged surfaces usually score, necessitating regrounding of the cylinders and refitting of new pistons and rings.

**Proper Placement of Battery.**  
Extreme care should be exercised when dry cells are used for ignition purposes to keep them in a dry place. Even though the cells may be new, any dampness will cause them to short circuit, and when this takes place there will be hard work starting the engine.

**Cleaning Spark Plugs.**  
To clean spark plugs, soak them in a mixture of alcohol and kerosene overnight. Then in the morning the carbon can be wiped off with a clean rag. Because of the highly glazed surface of the plugs, emery cloth or sand paper should never be used. When the glazed surface becomes roughened, the plug quickly fouls and stops firing.

**Rusty Rims Cause Leaky Tubes.**  
Never permit the rim to rust. Particles of the rust will work inside the casing and cut the tube. Though these holes are too small to be seen by the naked eye, they leak enough air to reduce pressure ten or fifteen pounds in a week.

**No Parking!**  
No motor vehicle should be parked at the entrance to hotels, theatres, office buildings, large stores, and other buildings to which there is a great amount of coming and going.

**Prompt Repair Saves More Trouble.**  
A broken spring leaf should be replaced immediately. If there is any delay, an extra strain is thrown on the remaining leaves, causing the entire spring to break.

**To Overcome Radiator Scale.**  
Scale in the radiator can be overcome by mixing a little glycerine with the cooling water. The glycerine should be used in proportions of half a pint to each five gallons of water.

**In Case of Accident.**  
Every operator of an automobile should have some knowledge of first-aid methods and carry as a part of his equipment a small case of first-aid materials.

**To Reduce Carbon.**  
Carbon in the cylinders may be reduced to a minimum if the mixture is set a little lean and the oil properly regulated.

If excessively high speeds are to be maintained for any length of time, it may be advisable to provide extra lubrication.

When the water runs slowly through the radiator, it suggests clogging at some place. It may be either sediment, slime, or dust and scale.

Crank or crankshaft misalignment will cause improper meshing of the gear teeth.

Generator brushes need no lubrication because the brushes contain all the oil that is necessary.

No amount of adjustment will remedy bad conditions if the moving parts of the carburetor are worn.

Because of the unbalanced condition, improper distribution of weight on a car will cause difficult steering.

When the brakes chatter or squeak when applied, it is a sign that the linings are glazed or the surface gritty.

Noises arising in the transmission are chiefly due to the gears.

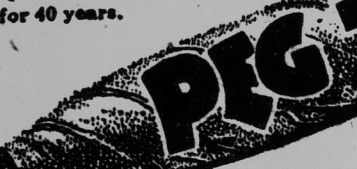

## Mrs. Johnson May Run The Farm With Magnus At Capitol

**Senator-Elect Give Her Credit for "Putting Him Over" by Looking After 140 Acres While He Conducted Campaign; Politics Don't Worry Her.**

Minneapolis, July 21.—When Magnus Johnson goes to Washington to take his seat in the United States Senate he may go alone. Mrs. Johnson has not yet made up her mind as to whether she will accompany him, as there is the farm to look after.

"Looking after things" on the Johnson 140 acres at Kimball has been Mrs. Johnson's contribution to her husband's campaign. He says that by assuming that responsibility and leaving him free to make his campaign she "put him over."

Mrs. Johnson doesn't take any such credit to herself. Mrs. Johnson may not be interested in women in politics; she says she never had time to worry much about such things. Mrs. Johnson is a quiet, plain sort of woman. She says very little. She was born on a farm near Kimball adjoining that on which she now lives. She has never lived anywhere else. Her father was born in Maine, her mother in Kentucky. She is a direct descendant

of General Israel Putnam of Revolutionary war fame. She married Magnus Johnson in 1899. They have six children.

"The boys run the farm and the girls do the housework, while I take care of the garden and the livestock and sort of manage them," she said. "We've only had to hire outside help once this summer."

Besides looking after the farm and raising her children, she has time to devote to the schools of her township. They have a consolidated school up there and Mrs. Johnson is clerk of the school boards. Between them, Mr. and Mrs. Johnson have held that job twenty-two years, but aside from that she has had no particular interest in public affairs.

After doing a bit of shopping Mrs. Johnson returned to Kimball today. She had been in Minneapolis with her husband for the last three or four days.

**FINDS A USE AT LAST FOR FIRE-PROOF COAL**

Mayor of Chelsea Gets 700 Tons of the Stuff to Grade Playgrounds.

Boston, July 21.—Seven hundred tons of black rocks, which unscrupulous coal operators in Pennsylvania sent into Massachusetts to be sold as fuel, will find a last resting place within the next few days on the playgrounds of Chelsea, where it will be used to fill holes and to smooth over rough places. The stuff was condemned last week by State Chemist Lytchko, and originally it was planned to dump it in the harbor, but Mayor Quigley of Chelsea thought it could be put to better use and entered a request for it.

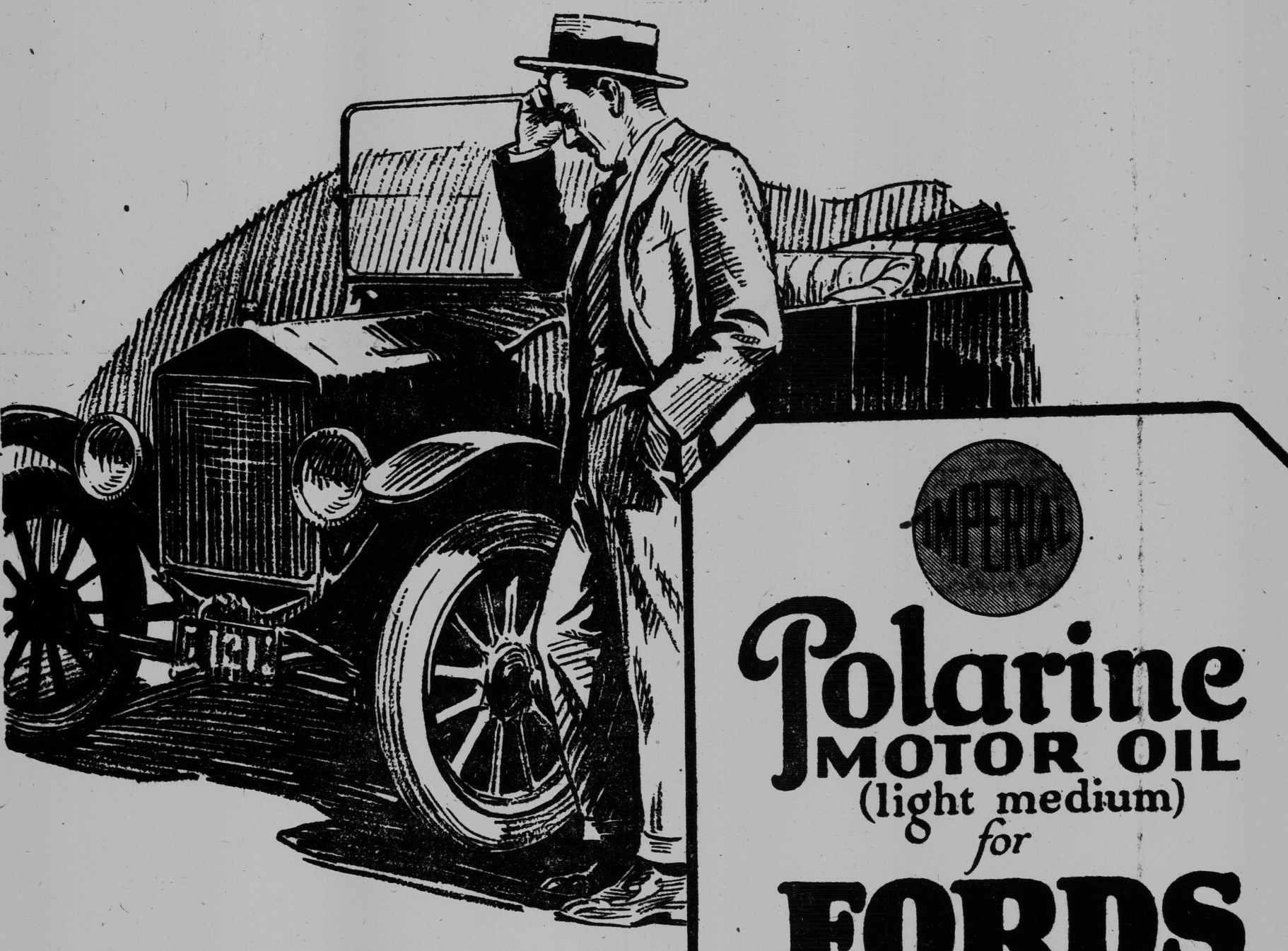

## BREW MORE BEER NOW THAN BEFORE DRY ERA

Hartford, Ct., July 21.—More real, old fashioned beer was brewed in Connecticut during the Government fiscal year ended June 30 than in the year before national prohibition went into effect. It was shown by an analysis of the United States internal revenue of five of reports submitted by nine breweries in the state. At the same time, sales of near beer fell off sharply from the record of last year.

Reports show that 2,665,891 gallons of real beer were legally manufactured in Connecticut breweries in the past year under the provision of the national prohibition act which permits the production of genuine beer in the process of manufacturing near beer, described in Government reports as a cereal beverage. In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1919, breweries of the state produced 2,644,807 gallons of beer, or 21,084 less than last year.
