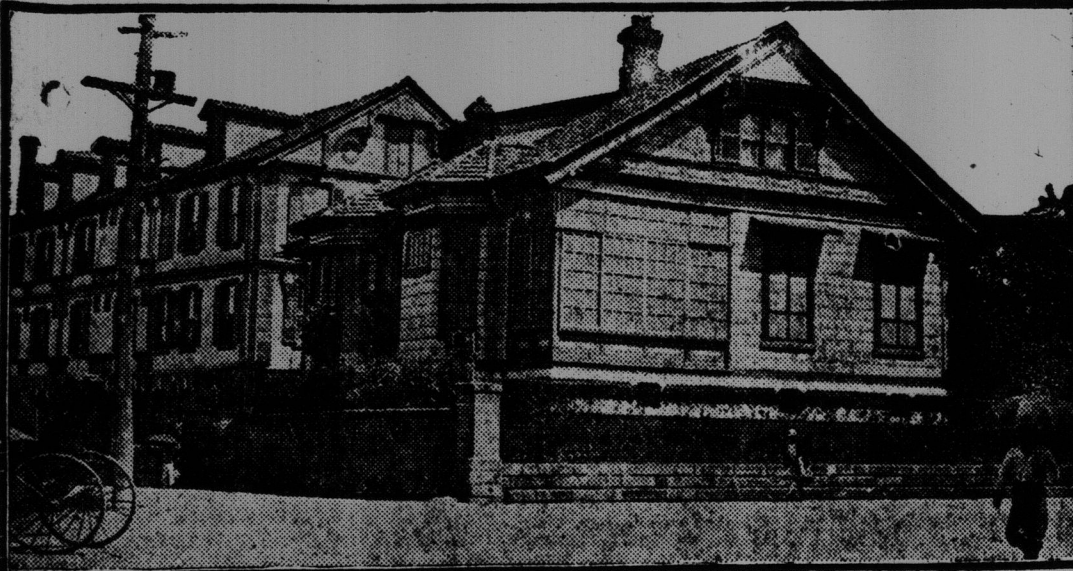

SAYS EGGS PROVE OLD IDEA

Prof. Blair of Princeton Comments on the Dinosaur Discovery.

Princeton, Sept. 29.—"This immensely sensational discovery confirms the beliefs which scientists have read for some years," declared Professor William B. Scott Blair, Professor of Geology in Princeton University, concerning the discovery by the Asiatic expedition of the American Museum of Natural History of twenty-five dinosaur eggs. Dr. Blair declared that while it was considered probable that that ancient reptiles were oviparous, it had never been expected to find the eggs intact.

"Scientists have thought for years that Central Asia must contain evidence of the life of higher groups. But they also thought there was no hope of discovering such quantities of specimens as have now been gathered," said Professor Blair, who was a classmate of Dr. Henry Fairfield Osborn, paleontologist with the third Asiatic expedition, at Princeton in 1897. "The whole work of this remarkable discovery is in direct confirmation of the beliefs of the past, for as a rule ninety-nine shells out of a hundred reptiles are egg-laying animals."

Dr. Blair was particularly interested to learn more concerning the exact nature of the eggs found and the conditions under which the nests were built and preserved, for he explained that usually eggs of this type of reptile have shells of a leathery consistency rather than the hard, brittle shells of other eggs. But to be perfectly preserved he thought these dinosaur eggs must be of the hard-shelled sort. He further pointed out that the crocodile, to which the dinosaur is in many ways closely related, has eggs of the hard-shelled character.

It is also probable that, like most reptiles, the dinosaur had nothing to do with the hatching of the eggs, Professor Blair declared, other than placing them in favorable conditions for incubation, since the spectacle of one of these huge lizards, weighing many tons, sitting on a nest, however firmly constructed, is hardly possible.

BUSINESS CALLED SOUND; FALL ACTIVITY PREDICTED

Purchasing Power Up, Says Harvard Economic Service.

Almost general improvement in the economic situation of the United States was apparent during August according to the Harvard Economic Service's review, the betterment in business bringing to an end the sharp recession of preceding months. For the first time since the end of March, the service continues, general wholesale commodity prices advanced.

Business activity, which declines seasonally in August, showed a smaller decrease than usual. The review continues:

"Although conditions are not satisfactory in all lines of business, the developments of the past month show that the general situation is sound. Money conditions remain favorable. We expect the continuance of the present strength in general commodity prices, and forecast the maintenance of a high level of business activity during the remainder of 1923."

The most striking development of August was the general upward movement of prices, following declines which had been in progress between March and July. Both Bradstreet's and Dun's index numbers advanced between August 1 and September 1, each by 0.7 per cent. This is the first advance recorded by either since last spring.

The service points out further that the outlook for an active fall trade is good. The purchasing power of the public, it says, has remained high, as shown by the record of retail trade and the movement of goods into trade channels (indicated by car loadings) during the summer. The effects of these conditions may be expected to appear in even greater degree with the advent of the season of more active buying during the next few months, it is added.

A BOER HOME

The three-room end-walled house in which the old couple lived stood close to a small stream behind a row of peach-trees. Every year from these trees they took a thank-offering of dried fruit to the Thanksgiving at Harmonia, and year by year they had beaten the stones of the peaches into the earthen floor of the living-room. Every morning Dattie sprinkles this floor with clear water from the stream and swept it with a stiff broom.

The living-room, with its three chairs, its gaily painted wagon-box, its string with things of leather, its table scrubbed a bright yellow with the yellow-bush that grew on the main roadside, and its gaily painted wagon-box, was a small square room with a half-door opening on to the yard behind the peach-trees. This was the only door the house possessed, for the doorways between the living-room and the kitchen and the living-room and the bedroom were empty.
