

LEARNS BROTHER SEVERELY HURT

Mrs. McGahey, Acadia St., Gets Bad News—Son Injured Yesterday.

The sympathy of friends will be extended to Mrs. George McGahey of Acadia street, whose son Clarence was brought home to her yesterday morning quite badly injured as a result of an explosion of a boiler in F. McCullough's barber shop in Waterloo street, and who last evening received a telegram from Halifax announcing that her brother Ernest McCrackin had been seriously injured and was not expected to live.

No further word had been received regarding her brother's condition today, but the telegram which arrived last night told that he had fallen thirty feet, striking on his head and had been taken to the Halifax hospital. A report from there said that his condition was critical and little hopes were entertained for his recovery.

BUFFALOES MAY LOCATE IN ST. JOHN
