

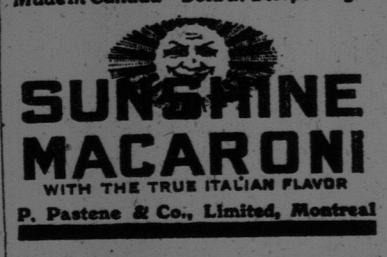
**REFUSE TO COMPEL ADMITTING CLERKS' RIGHT TO ORGANIZE**

Commons Committee Rejects Bank Act Amendment Providing For Recognition by Banks of Employees' Right to Association—Fielding Favors It.

Ottawa, June 13.—After about ten weeks of deliberation and amending the Bank Act revision was virtually completed this afternoon by the Committee on Banking and Commerce and a motion to reprint the bill as amended was passed. It is expected the amended act will be ready to submit to the House of Commons on Monday next. On the assurance of the

Minister of Finance this afternoon "it will be given priority over practically all other business," so it should be finally disposed of in the House at the end of next week and sent on to the Senate.

Two or three amendments were dealt with this afternoon, notably that of J. S. Woodsworth, Labor, Centre Winnipeg, providing for recognition by the banks of the right of its employees to association for all lawful purposes. This was finally defeated by a vote of nine for and sixteen against. Hon. W. S. Fielding and W. P. McLean, Conservative, South York, voting with the Progressives for the amendment. In moving the amendment, Mr. Woodsworth said it would be simply carrying out a provision of the Treaty of Versailles. Whenever bank clerks had sought to organize for mutual benefit they were discouraged and obstructed by their employing banks. Salaries paid to clerks were too low. In a large number of cases they were less than \$100 a month. "We cannot insist by law upon the banks paying a decent wage but we can give those clerks the right to organize. The principle is recognized internationally," he said.

**I. O. D. E. DISCUSSES CHILD WELFARE**

Much Easier to Get "Big Brothers" For Boys Than "Big Sisters" For Girls, Committee Convener Tells Convention.

(By Canadian Press) Quebec, June 13.—"It is easier to get big brothers for the little brothers than it is to get big sisters for the little sisters," said Miss Charlotte Whitton, of Ottawa, convener of the committee on child welfare, in addressing the afternoon session of the annual convention of the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire, in session here today. Miss Whitton was speaking on child welfare work as carried on throughout the Dominion by chapters of the order, and was making a plea for more interest in and sympathy with the delinquent girl. Among the suggestions offered to chapters as to possible ways of helping to better conditions or lower the infant death rate was one to the effect that prosperous urban chapters should adopt outlying areas and provide the services of a doctor or nurse. It was said that in 1920 one district in Alberta had had an infant death rate of 180.4 per 1,000 and upon examination it had been found that of 226 births in the year there had been no physician present at 467. Special reference was made to the importance of play in the life of the child, and the speaker urged the women to insure the children of their respective communities against lagged habits and aimless idleness by providing recreation facilities in the community.

**FULLER MAY TELL OF BUCKETING RING ALLEGED TO EXIST**

New York Broker Says He May be Able to Give Valuable Information Regarding Own Company and Other Persons.

(By Canadian Press) New York, June 13.—Possibility of important disclosures concerning the operation of bucket shops in the Wall Street district loomed as imminent tonight. Edward M. Fuller, and William Frank McGee, partners in the most spectacular bucket shop failure of recent years, went before General Sessions Judge Mott today and pleaded guilty of bucketing. This afternoon, Fuller was taken under guard to the offices of Harold Coffin, referee in bankruptcy for further examination concerning the affairs of his house. He pleaded for and obtained an adjournment until tomorrow, however, at which time he said he might be able to give "valuable information not only concerning the assets of E. M. Fuller and Company, but with reference to various persons who might be responsible for the obligations of Fuller and Company." This was taken in some quarters as an indication that he might reveal connections of the Fuller firm with a huge bucket shop "ring," existence of which has been a matter of gossip in Wall Street for months. How far Fuller would go in an attempt to win clemency from the court when he comes up for sentence, however, was problematical. His partner, McGee, in announcing his decision to plead guilty, said this morning that he had decided on that course to "save innocent friends from further embarrassment." Fuller, while he did not contradict McGee's statement, made no such statement himself. Judge Mott let it be known shortly after Fuller's and McGee's plea had been entered that he had not made up his mind what punishment should be meted out. The maximum he could impose is five years.
