MARINE STRIKE AT HALIFAX ENDS. Halifax, N. S., Aug. 11.—The marine strike, which involved at one time 2,000 men and which commenced on June 4, is at an end. Last night the plumbers, coopermills and pipelitters employed at the Halifax shipyards, the three trades unions that had remained on strike after other union workers had abandoned the struggle and accepted the shipyard offer of a five cent increase, voted to return to work. All but one member of the three unions was in favor of this decision, which affects 100 men.
