POPULATION INCREASED FIVE IN LAST CENTURY

Inhabitants of Pitcairn Island Number 175.

New York, Sept. 14.—The population of Pitcairn Island, a tiny speck of land rising from the mid-Pacific, has been increased by five souls since the official count of last century, according to Robert O'Brien, master of the freighter Mimsa, which touched there last month en route here from Australia.

The little country, a British possession, now has a population of 175. At the last previous count there were but 170.

Captain O'Brien said the residents, descendants of fifteen mutineers from the British ship Bounty, who settled there in 1789 with wives brought from Polynesia, are thriving, and as yet are showing no signs of the mental deterioration which scientists predicted for them as a consequence of long continued intermarriage.

The island, according to O'Brien, is rich in fruit and vegetable products. A supply of these and fresh spring water was furnished him for his homeward journey.

Pitcairn Island is of volcanic origin, of only two square miles area, but with a mountain peak rising to a height of 2,000 feet. It carries on trade with Mangariva in a vessel owned and operated by the islanders.

SUPRARENAL GLAND PRODUCES GLUCOSE AFTER HOMER BY RUTH

What happens at the Polo Grounds when Babe Ruth knocks out one of his occasional home runs will be made clear by the following scientific answer to this question, as supplied by nerve specialists at local hospitals: There arises a tremendous concept of anticipation which is fulfilled when the homer is made; the sympathetic nervous system overstimulates the endocrine substance, the suprarenal gland affects the insoluble glycogen so as to change it to glucose; the thyroid gland affects the body's protid metabolism so as to supply new protid substances for those which are broken down, and the crowd, displaying mass emotional instability, acting along the familiar lines of mob psychology, brings about a general demonstration in which individual participation is wholly involuntary.

When Babe misses the ball, however, the visual centres register the fact that he is making ready for another attempt, and, all is well.

PRESCRIPTION WRITER IS TOO SWIFT FOR CHICAGO

Chicago, Sept. 14.—Federal authorities have revoked the liquor license of Dr. M. A. Fash, who is termed the champion prescription writer. It developed during the hearing that the physician wrote 808 liquor prescriptions in one day. The record for four days was 710.

It was figured that with this record the doctor must have started to work at seven in the morning and did not stop until midnight. The physician declared that he had given an examination of three and one-half minutes to each patient before deciding that their systems needed a stimulant. He admitted that he did not stop for meals, having his lunches brought to his office.

He attempted to defend himself on the ground that he did not understand the law.

THE DEATH OF OLIVE THOMAS ACCIDENTAL

Paris, Sept. 14.—The doctors who performed the autopsy on the body of Olive Thomas, the American moving picture actress, concluded that death was due to "poisoning through intoxication with a substance," taken accidentally.

It is probable the body will be shipped to New York on Saturday on the liner Mauretania. Jack Pickford, husband of the dead woman, and a few friends will accompany the body to the United States.

ARNSTEIN LOSES HIS APPEAL; MUST SUBMIT NOW TO EXAMINATION

New York, Sept. 14.—Federal Judge Mantou denied a motion by counsel for Sales W. (Nicky) Arnstein, alleged "master mind" in Wall street bond thefts involving millions of dollars, for a stay pending an appeal from a recent court order directing Arnstein to answer questions regarding his assets.

The ruling makes it necessary for Arnstein to submit immediately to examination in bankruptcy.

THE ONTARIO FARMERS AGAINST RATES INCREASE

Toronto, Sept. 14.—Secretary J. J. Morrison of the United Farmers of Ontario said today that the U. F. O. would join in an appeal to the dominion government against the increases in railway rates.

REGISTRATION LOW

Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—Opening of registration for the liquor referendum election on October 25, indicated either there is little interest in the prohibition question, or most of the voters are already registered. Up to noon today there had been only a scattering registration in any of the districts.

TO DEPORT 3,000 CHINESE.

Philippines Authorities Accuse Them of Smuggling Opium.

Manila, P. I., Sept. 14.—More than 3,000 Chinese on the Islands of Mindanao and Sulu who entered the Philippines from Borneo in violation of the immigration laws will be deported in accordance with a decision of the Philippine Council of State, it was announced today.

The Chinese were alleged to have smuggled large quantities of opium into Mindanao and afterward distributed it throughout the Philippines. The territorial authorities are much concerned over the existence of a big opium traffic and have taken drastic measures to wipe it out.

RARE GERMAN CHEMICALS NOW PRODUCED IN AMERICA

Chicago, Sept. 14.—The German monopoly on rare chemicals has been broken, according to statements made today by Dr. H. E. Clarke of Rochester, N. Y., before the Organic Division of the American Chemical Society, in session here.

Before the war, hundreds of chemicals essential to laboratory work were made exclusively in Germany, Dr. Clarke said, but now 800 of these rare chemicals are produced in America.

FRENCH BABIES FATE

Paris, France, Sept. 14.—Startling figures in regard to the infant mortality of France have just been published. Of every thousand children one in four die before the age of one. The cause of the heavy mortality is attributed to the lack of maternity hospitals and child welfare institutions.

GAS HENS TO AID ROBBERY.

Paris, France, Sept. 14.—A novel procedure was taken by a thief at Massy. He was an ex-soldier and brought with him a gas projector which he retained after the war. So that the hens would be disturbed at their noise alarm the household he gassed the birds.

FIRST AERIAL BIRTH.

Paris, France, Sept. 14.—The first aerial birth in history is now a matter of record. "Follette," the pet dog of Henri Rogel, the French air minister, gave birth to nine puppies while she was flying in her master's plane 12,000 feet above Rome last week. The puppies and their mother are getting along nicely.

HARVEST BEER STOPPED.

London, Eng., Sept. 14.—The farmers' practice of giving beer to laborers in the harvest fields has practically become obsolete in Bucks, after having been observed for generations. The chief reasons are the present high price at which beer is sold and the high wages paid to farm laborers.

WAR MEMORIAL BANNED.

Fleet, Eng., Sept. 14.—Owing to threats having been received that it would be destroyed if erected the Fleet vestry has decided to drop a proposal for a war memorial cross. The objection was because the memorial was designed by an ex-Austrian sculptor who became naturalized.

SHORTER HOURS FOR WIVES

London, Eng., Sept. 14.—Dr. T. Baillie Smith, health officer at Aberlery, advocates shorter hours for wives. He declares that the women at the head of households should obtain more rest and believes that men should help in household duties in order that this may be brought about.

FEARED BLINDNESS, SUICIDE

London, Eng., Sept. 14.—Elizabeth Bonford, 31, committed suicide by throwing herself under a train. She had recently suffered from defective eyesight and left a letter saying she feared she was going blind and decided to take her life.

COAL FIND IN BELGIUM

Brussels, Belgium, Sept. 14.—The discovery of fresh coal deposits in the provinces of Hainaut and Limburg is reported.

COIN SCARCE IN ROME.

Rome, Italy, Sept. 14.—Copper coins are becoming scarce in Rome, and stamps are being freely used for change in shops and tramway cars.
