SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA

Profits After all Expenses Deducted Amount to Nearly Million and a Half Dollars.

The Bank of Nova Scotia was incorporated in 1852 and the statement of its affairs as at December 31, 1918, which appears in today's issue is, therefore, the 67th of the long series. It has always kept itself in a position of great strength and the statement now being submitted to its shareholders shows its reputation to be well maintained and to be equally well deserved. The bank has had a successful year. Profits, after deducting the expenses of operation and providing for all other charges, ascertained and estimated, amounted to \$1,411,928. The sum of \$560,269 was brought forward from the previous year as undivided profit and, adding this to the net profits, \$1,872,198 became available for distribution. \$210,000 was taken to pay the annual dividend, the war tax on circulation took \$55,000, contributions amounting to \$47,200 were made to various patriotic funds, \$30,000 was added to the officers' pension fund and \$150,000 was written off bank premises account, leaving \$746,998 of undivided profit to be carried forward into the current year. The total assets are increased by \$23,022,448 to \$161,229,703, of which \$35,287,266 is represented by actual cash on hand and in the central gold reserves as security for the excess circulation—almost 65 per cent of the bank's total liabilities to others than its own shareholders. Other quickly available resources—balances due by other banks, government and other securities, etc.—are again seen to form a large proportion of the total assets—an element of safety and an evidence of strength which must continue to commend this bank to the confidence of its large and growing number of depositors.

The circulation has increased very materially, notes amounting to \$17,568,924 being outstanding as compared with \$12,171,422 a year ago. Non-interest-bearing deposits show an increase of \$21,883,772, or over 82 per cent. Interest-bearing deposits are reduced by \$3,108,781, due to the very large withdrawals made for investment in war loans. Total deposits show a net increase of some \$18,000,000. Balances due to other banks are practically unchanged. The paid-up capital and reserve remain at the former figures, viz: \$6,400,000 and \$12,000,000, respectively.

The Bank of Nova Scotia has always stood high in the estimation of its patrons and the general public and the statement now published will show this confidence to be fully merited and its continuance success to be assured.
