

There has been a ready response to the plan and it is expected that in a few



Paris, March 31.—The intrinsigant prius a report that the indemnity which Germany must pay for the damages of the war has been fixed at a figure between 100,000,000,000 and 200,000,000,000 francs. The yearly payments will increase as Germany's economic life revives.

TROUBLE IN KOREA SPREADS
San Francisco, March 31.—Demonstrations throughout Korea are growing stronger; 32,000 persons have been injured; 100,000 have been injured, including children and girls, and Christian churches, schools and stores have been closed, according to a cablegram received yesterday by the headquarters of the Korean National Association here from Rev. H. Yun Soon, special representative of the Korean Independent Union at Shanghai.

Honolulu, March 30.—Korea has formed a provisional government in Manchuria, according to cable advice from Koreans in Shanghai received today by a local organization of Koreans. Troops of the new government are said to have crossed the Yumankang River from Manchuria into Korea. During demonstrations in Seoul on March 25 and 26 both sides suffered casualties.
