SCOTIA FOR THE SUMMER
Chief Forester Going to Quebec For Important Convention

Fredericton, N. B., June 21—His Lordship Bishop Richardson, accompanied by his family, left last night for his summer residence at Smith's Cove, N. S. They will occupy the summer home until autumn.

Repairs of the flooring of the Fredericton-Devon highway bridge have begun. The removal of the flooring which should have been done under the previous provincial administration was neglected with the result that the burden has been thrown upon the department now headed by Hon. Mr. Veniot. G. H. Prince, chief forester of New Brunswick, will leave early next week for Montreal having been invited by the Canadian Pulp & Paper Association to attend the summer convention of the Woodlands branch of that association at Grand Mere and Berthier, Quebec. The provincial nurseries at Berthier and Poudic will be inspected and a demonstration of the working and efficiency of the new forest service hydroplanes in detecting forest fires will be given. Tractors and slash burning also will be demonstrated. It is expected that pulp companies of New Brunswick will be represented.

FIRST GRADUATE OF THE

ROTHESAY CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL
The teachers and pupils of the Rothersay Consolidated school gave a pleasant entertainment last evening in the assembly hall in honor of Miss Grace Harrison, who is the first graduate. The school was opened three years ago when three or four of the schools in the parish were united. The pupils were to have an outing and picnic on Long Island, but as the weather man intervened, the programme was changed to an entertainment of musical numbers, speeches and an indoor track meet. The events in the meet were named after the outdoor events, but as there was not any too much room, they had to take a humorous turn, which was something new and was enjoyed by all. After the programme, A. W. McMackin, secretary of the school trustees, made a few appropriate remarks, congratulating Miss Harrison on her success. C. T. Wetmore, the principal of the school, and Rev. Canon A. W. Daniel, each made a short address. The entertainment closed with the singing of the National anthem.

MILITARY MATTERS

Men Signing on for Permanent Force — Army Contracts Open to Civilians — Depot Battalion Non-Existent Next Week

Enlistment for the permanent force of Canada seems to be fairly popular in St. John. Names are now being taken locally for service therein and during the last few days some twenty have been taken while many others have displayed an interest, seeking information and facts relating to the terms of enlistment. These are much the same as with the expeditionary force, except that the clause "for duration of the war" is not applicable, and the rates pay and allowances are similar to those prevailing for war service. Some fifteen men who are in uniform with the 7th Canadian Garrison Regiment here have signed for the permanent force already, while others have not yet been sworn. The period of enlistment is for two years. All who have signed thus far have done so for the infantry.

Civilian Contracts.
Authority has been received at headquarters for awarding to civilian contractors any army work to be done in this district in future. Heretofore the engineers have been attending to the bulk of construction and repair work but they are sadly diminishing in strength until at present they constitute only about six all ranks. These will probably be out of the service within a short time.

Depot Battalion No More.
The first of the week it is expected that the Depot Battalion will become non-existent. At present there are but one officer and two other ranks attached to it. This unit was created to embrace the men who were enrolled when the military service act came into force and quite a number have passed through its ranks. Any deficiencies to be attended to under this act are now being looked after by the district depot, which is also attending to casualties and all men from hospital.

Less of Khaki.
Each week now sees fewer men in khaki about the city as with the return of so many from overseas the work of the local staff is decreasing. At present there are in the vicinity of 250 men in uniform, more or less, on duty here and in Fredericton. They are divided among a wide variety of branches. The military police force numbers seventy-two, the cavalry service corps forty-eight, the 7th C. G. B. thirty-nine, the ordnance about fifteen, and so on, each unit having a small number of men on hand, just sufficient for the performance of the duties devolving upon it. "Fatigues" are of course still necessary and men must be kept to do the several odd little jobs classed under this heading. In the military hospital in West St. John there are some forty-six soldiers, including patients.

FIRST YACHT RACE

The date for the annual cruise has been fixed and the start will be made from the club house on August 9 for a cruise on the St. John river and some of its tributaries. With the revival of interest in the club, it is expected that these "hughey days" will be on all their old time festivity. The annual service will be held at Crystal Beach on the following Sunday.
