### ACTOR MARRIES WEALTHY WIDOW

Orin Johnson's Bride Was Left \$20,000,000 by Her First Husband

New York, June 28.—Mrs. Isabel B. Smith, widow of Charles Robinson Smith of Neenah, Wis., and this city, and Orin Johnson, the actor, were married, at the home of the bride, 570 Park avenue here this week by Rev. H. M. Warren in the presence of about fifty relatives and friends.  
Mrs. Smith's first husband died at their home in this city, 260 West Seventy-second street, in May, 1916. He was a classmate of President Wilson's at Princeton, and was one of the wealthiest men in Wisconsin. He was a banker and timber man, and his estate at the time of his death was estimated at more than \$20,000,000. He left two sons and a daughter by a former marriage.  
Mr. Johnson was born in Louisville, Ky., and made his earliest appearance in New York at the People's Theatre, in 1890, as Jack Rogers, in "The Governor." He has been a prominent leading man for many years. He first appeared as a star in 1903, as the Marquis de Roulerie in "Hearts Courageous."  
He was identified in leading parts in the plays in which he appeared were "Squire Kate," "A Bachelor's Romance," "Mice and Men," "Miss Hobbs," "A Royal Family," and "The Road to Maryland." In recent years he appeared in "The Commuters," "Father Jerome," and in "Speed," and was also in stock for a season at Los Angeles.

### BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL.

At a meeting of the council of the board of trade, held yesterday at noon, many matters of outstanding importance to the citizens at the present time were discussed, including those relating to the port of St. John, the Eastern Steamship Company's line connection with this port from United States ports, the refrigeration of fish, fire insurance, etc.  
The matter of the distribution of the twenty-five bushels of seed wheat purchased by the board of trade early in the spring was enquired into. It was reported that this seed wheat had been distributed among farmers residing at St. Martins, Fairfield, Hickey road, Manawagonish road and Dipper Harbor.


