He was a banker and timber man, and his estate at the time of his death was estimated at more than \$20,000,000. He left two sons and Mr. Johnson was born in Louisville, Ky., and made his earliest appearance in New York at the People's Theatre, in 1890, as Jack Rogers, in "The Governess." He has been a prominent leading man for many years. He first appeared as a star in 1903, as the Marquis de Roulerie in "Hearts Courageous."


