## Daily Hints For the Cook

**LEMON PIE WITH BREAD CRUMBS.**  
Two slices of baker's bread, one large or boiling water turned over bread and oak until soft, then squeeze quite dry of water, and butter size of walnut, add juice of one lemon, yolks of two eggs, a cup of sugar. Bake with one crust and rest, with the beaten whites of eggs and sugar. Brown in oven.

**RICE MOLD.**  
Line a slightly buttered bread pan or tart brick mold with warm steamed rice, saving walls from three-fourths to an inch thick. Fill the center with cold boiled chicken, flaked and moistened with egg yolk. Cover with rice, set in pan of hot water, cover with buttered paper and bake one hour. Turn on a hot platter, pour out egg sauce and garnish with sliced hard-boiled eggs and parsley.

## WAS A COSTLY EXPERIMENT FOR THE TOWN

Municipal Gas Lighting Powers Anything But Success in Elbeuf

Embryo Banker Gets Into Hands of Card Sharps and It Means Some \$50,000 Loss—Invisible Uniform a Success or Otherwise?

Paris, Oct. 23.—The dramatic author, H. Henri Bernstein, whose last piece, "Après Moi," was withdrawn at the Comedie Francaise on account of hostile demonstrations, has just obtained permission to re-enter the army and to perform his military service in the Second Artillery Regiment. The pretext for the demonstration, which were partly of an Anti-Semitic character, was the discovery of the fact that H. Bernstein in a fit of youthful folly, as he himself subsequently explained, had many years ago deserted from the army.

**An Experiment That Failed**  
The rate-payers of Elbeuf, a town of 20,000 inhabitants, and the centre of the flourishing cloth industry in the Seine Interieure, have been taught a sharp lesson with regard to the folly of municipalization. The town council was persuaded by M. Mouchel, the Socialist mayor and deputy of the town, to manufacture and supply its own gas to the citizens. The experiment has proved disastrous. At a meeting of the council on Monday last M. Mouchel admitted that the financial situation was as bad as it could be, and that a special rate would have to be imposed in order to make up the deficiency for \$12,000 on this year's working of the gas service. He did not conceal that the situation would be still worse next year, and that, in fact, in order to place the gas-works on a sound financial footing it would be necessary to find a sum of \$39,000.

The report on the working of the new municipal service shows that the rate-payers have not even the satisfaction of being supplied with good gas. Never was the town so badly lighted. In some quarters of the town the lamps are lighted too late and in others they are put out too late.

The director has been changed three times, the staff does not do its work conscientiously, a sum of \$2,000 has been lost because the coal contracts were given out at the least favorable moment of the year, and the result of all this mismanagement is that the price of gas will have to be raised. With praiseworthy frankness the mayor takes all the blame on himself. "Although I am a partisan of the regime," he says, "I shall perhaps see myself forced to abandon it." In any case the mayor declares that he considers his public career at an end.

**In the Hands of Card Sharps**  
An interesting case, in which three Italian youths are charged with swindling a wealthy young German out of many thousands of dollars, is now engaging the attention of the French courts. About a year ago Max Gochen, the son of a wealthy parent, living at Frankfurt-on-Main, was sent to Paris to complete his studies of the French language, and to do something of the sense of banking, before settling down as a member of the parental firm at Frankfurt. During his stay in the Ville Lumiere the young man seems to have devoted most of his time to what is called here La Banque du Tapage, or, in plain English, the gaming table.

He took lodgings in a family pension, in the Rue Galvée, where he met a young Italian gentleman, of elegant manners and address, who was known as the Comte de Montigny. Gochen, who belonged to a decent, middle-class family, was much taken with the sophisticated Italian nobleman, who in turn, took notice of the young German, and introduced him to other Italian noblemen like himself.

One of these was the Comte Carponetto, and another the Duke de Carmignani. They went to the theatres together, and dined and supped and saw the sights of Paris on the other side of the currency, and had a very good time. Then one evening young Gochen took up the study of banking with the Italian friends. The first lesson was given one evening, after dinner, in a cafe in the Avenue de la Grande Armee. It was not proposed, of course, as a serious game, but just to pass the time. Baccarat was the particular line of banking to which the innocent Max directed his attention, and the first lesson cost him \$80.

But the old gentleman away in Frankfurt was generous, and young Gochen did not mind the expense.

A few days later Max and his instructors foregathered at an establishment in Montmartre, where his instruction was continued. This time he lost a matter of \$2,000. This pretty nearly exhausted his ready cash, and he applied to his father for more. The old man thought the course of banking that his son was following was too expensive, and directed him to return home; so back to Frankfurt went Max.

A couple of weeks later, his Italian friends turned up in the city on the Main, and were introduced to the Gochen family circle. They made such an excellent impression that Max was permitted to accompany the "noblemen" on a little trip to the Riviera. Needless to say, the banking studies were at once resumed, and it is equally unnecessary to add that Max always lost. One little game cost him \$27,294.

At the close of the game, the young German, who was very short-sighted physically as well as mentally, was modestly contemplating the table, when he noticed some unusual apparatus under the tablecloth. There were a number of tiny rubber tubes there, with bulbs at the ends, opposite where the Italian noblemen sat. Max was a little puzzled by their presence, and wondered what they were for; but his friends easily explained them, and the innocent German thought no more about them.

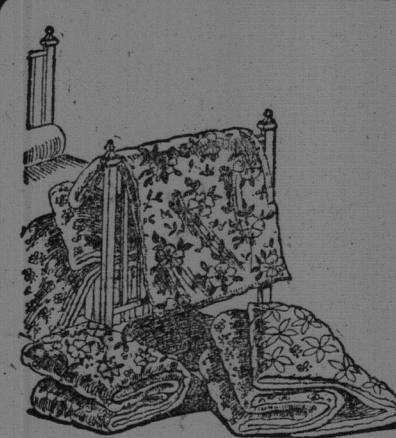

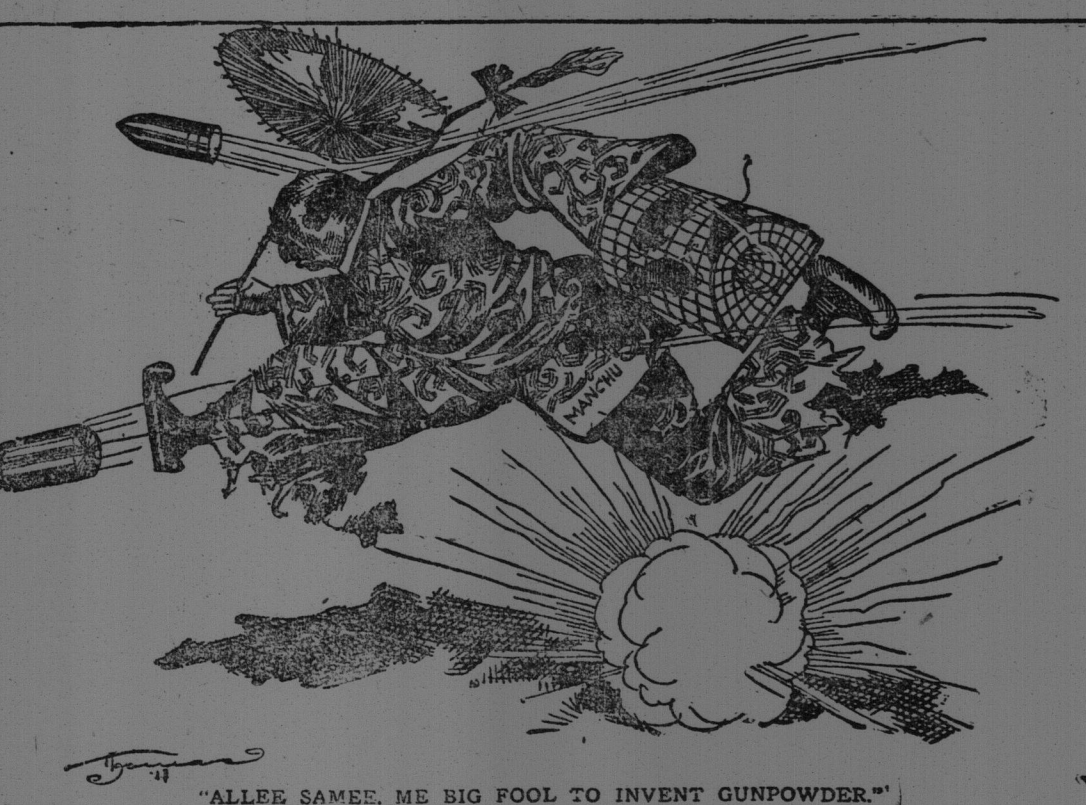
