LOCAL NEWS

CITY WAGE SCALE.
Asked this morning about the matter of the wage scale for city employees the Mayor said that he had been pressed aside by press of other business, but that consideration would be given to it as soon as possible.

THE MAYOR'S PERMIT.
Mayor Fisher said this morning that he would present a report this afternoon on the matter of a permit for his building in Charlotte street for which the city building inspector has refused a permit for repairs.

STREET LIGHTING.
Commissioner Thornton said this morning that he had had a conference with some of the members of the Civic Hydro Commission relative to a price for street lighting and that the matter would be taken up this afternoon at the meeting of the Common Council.

BEACONSFIELD MEETING.
The Beaconsfeld committee on fire protection composed of J. A. Barry, W. I. Fenton, G. Earle Logan, Councilor Murray Campbell and Thomas O'Leary will meet tomorrow evening with Commissioner Thornton in the latter's office to discuss the matter of protection by the city and the basis upon which that may be secured.

RENT OF MARKET STORE.
Among the matters which were expected to come before the Common Council this afternoon is the question of the renting of the store in Charlotte street formerly occupied by J. & J. Mauston. The rental from this store was as from others in the Market building used to be \$1,000, but some time ago it was raised to \$1,500. It is understood that \$2,000 will be secured for the stand in question.

WOMAN ADMITS FRAUD CHARGE

Received Goods from Local Merchants Under False Pretences—\$200 Fine in Liquor Case.

Mary Halliday, who has been before the police court several times during the last few weeks, this morning was elected to be tried by Magistrate Ritchie rather than be sent up for trial and have her case tried by a jury. She was charged with obtaining goods under false pretences from merchants about the city. The prisoner entered a plea of guilty in all the charges and today admitted that she had fraudulently received goods from Macaulay Bros. to the value of \$37 and also from A. C. Smith to the value of \$14.75. As she entered a plea of guilty to the charges she was sentenced to 60 days in jail. She was remanded to jail to await final disposition.

James Garnett pleaded guilty to having intoxicated liquor in his bar, 101 Main street. He was fined \$200 or on default of payment to spend six months in jail. The fine was paid.

Rev. W. W. Malcolm Elected Moderator of Presbytery

FORMER ST. JOHN CLERGYMAN HONORED AT QUARTERLY MEETING

Dr. J. S. Sutherland Re-elected Clerk—Matter of Call to Rev. F. S. Dowling Over to Afternoon Session—Grants Asked.

Rev. W. W. Malcolm, of St. Stephen was the unanimous choice of the St. John Presbytery as moderator for the coming year at the quarterly meeting held this morning in St. Andrew's church. Rev. A. V. Morash, of Sussex, the present moderator, presided and Rev. J. S. Sutherland, D. D., was clerk. Dr. Sutherland was re-elected as clerk for next year and the office of treasurer was left open for the present.

George F. Sears, of Norton; Rev. S. R. Prince, of Woodstock; Rev. William Swan, of Debec; Rev. E. J. Kerr, of St. George; Rev. J. H. McLean, of Harvey; Rev. W. A. Ross, of Milltown; Rev. Peter Jackson, of Grand Falls; Rev. R. J. Miller, of Grand Falls; Rev. W. M. Townsend, Rev. F. S. Dowling, Rev. J. A. Morrison, D. D., Rev. W. H. Spencer and Rev. Hugh Miller, of St. John; T. B. Spedy, of St. Stephen; C. S. Everett, of St. Andrews; H. S. Campbell and James Thompson, of Fredericton; J. J. Galbraith, of Lorneville; J. J. Morrison, of Norton; H. P. Craig, of Marvey; D. Evans, of Edmunston; A. F. Bentley, of St. Martins; James Miller, of H. A. Corbett, of Lower Millstream; Hon. J. G. Forbes, Dr. G. G. Corbet and Robert Reid, of St. John.

The matter of the call from the congregation of St. Andrew's church Sydney, to Rev. F. S. Dowling, was put on the docket for an early hour in the afternoon to give the members of the congregation of St. Andrew's church a chance to be heard in regard to Mr. Dowling's leaving. Grants for augmented churches in the province were discussed.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the moderator. The secretary said he had received from Plaster Rock the name of Rev. A. C. Cameron as minister of that congregation. He wished to know if he was a regular member of this presbytery. He was informed that Mr. Cameron was appointed by the home missions committee. Rev. W. M. Townsend moved that he be accepted by the presbytery and his motion was passed. It was announced that Rev. D. S. Gardner, of Miramichi presbytery, was present and he was invited to sit in correspondence.

Rev. Mr. Dowling's call, it was decided to take up the mat-

ter of the call to Rev. F. S. Dowling, as the second matter of business of the afternoon session.

Officers Elected.

The election of officers was proceeded with. When calls came for nominations for the office of moderator, Hon. J. G. Forbes moved the election of Rev. W. W. Malcolm of St. Stephen. This was seconded by Rev. J. S. Sutherland. Mr. Malcolm was unanimously elected as moderator for the coming year. He thanked the presbytery feelingly, saying he felt it to be the greatest honor of his life.

Rev. J. S. Sutherland, D. D., was re-elected clerk of the presbytery unanimously. The office of treasurer was temporarily left open.

The report of the general interest committee was read by Rev. J. A. Ramsey and was adopted by the meeting.

Home Missions.

Rev. W. M. Townsend read the report of the home missions committee. He had received a request from T. H. Whelpley, at St. Martins, for a certificate of the character of his works as a student minister there. It was decided to issue a regular presbyterial certificate in his favor.

The committee appointed to visit Hampton was unable to get there on account of storms. Rev. Peter Jackson said he was satisfied with the treatment now being accorded him in Hampton. A grant of \$400 was recommended by the committee. Mr. Jackson agreed to waive his claims, which had made a visitation necessary, in the case of the grant being given.

No supplies could be obtained for the churches at Van Buren and Minto. The report of Miss E. E. Murphy, session teacher at Minto, was read and accepted.

Grant Applications.

Applications for grants had been received from St. Columbia Church, Fairville, for \$400; Grand Falls, for \$500; Hampton, for \$500; Kineardine, for \$500; Lorneville, for \$500; Richmond, for \$500; St. George, for \$500; South Richmond, for \$300, and St. Matthew's, St. John, for \$500. It was decided to apply for a grant of \$500 for Norton and Lower Millstream combined.

There was much discussion over the action of the home missions board in offering to Buctouche the sum of \$200 if the congregation would raise an extra \$100.

Rev. Dr. Ross said that the home missions board had not done their best and he did not feel that some of the congregations were trying as hard. Many of the churches now getting grants did not need them, he thought, if the people would do their part.

McINTYRE IN BOUT IN PORTLAND, ME.

Will Meet Jimmy Cox, of Athlone, Ireland, There Tonight.

Johnny McIntyre, well known here, will box Jimmy Cox, in Portland, Me., tonight. Of Cox, a Portland paper published the following:

Worcester sports writers are inclined to think that Jimmy Cox, the welterweight who fights Johnny McIntyre on the Eastern A. C. bill next Tuesday night, is a real contender. They think the boy from Athlone, Ireland, is better than he has been showing in Bay State rings, and yet he has been winning by a comfortable margin over his opponents. McIntyre who has lost but three decisions in 109 battles is a very modest boy, but says that he won't give Cox any chance to hold back. The Worcester boy will have to show everything he's got.

May Be Playing Possum.

"Has Jimmy Cox been holding back his real ability ever since he came to Worcester in the hope of pulling some of the local headlines into a bout with him, and then jumping into favor by coming through with a knockout?" asks the boxing writer of the Worcester Telegram.

"Of course Cox has shown plenty of ability whether he has been holding back or not," continues the writer. "But it is really much faster than he has uncovered? For instance when Cox fought Billy Shannon, he gave the Boston boy such a thrashing in one round, that they stopped the fight. Shannon had been moving along very fast until that night, and never before had been in danger of a knockout."

Made French Look Foolish.

"Again Cox met Tommy French. For several rounds he made French look like a novice and knocked him to the floor several times. Then he appeared to slow down. Was it because he was tired or rather was it for fear that he would reveal himself as too good a boxer and therefore be avoided by the Worcester boys?"

One thing is certain. Cox's record in England makes him appear as too fast for the crowd he has been traveling. He has one fight with Billy Wells the fighter now managed by Charlie Harvey and it was one of the best fights ever seen in the welterweight division in England.

A RECORD MONTH AT G. P. HOSPITAL

Large Number of Patients Treated—Provision for New Service and Other Business Transacted at a Meeting of the Board of Commissioners.

At a meeting yesterday of the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Hospital with M. E. Agar presiding, it was reported that the month just closed was a record one in point of number of patients treated and work done. There was an average of 146.7 patients throughout the month. The resignation of Dr. A. Davis from the staff of internes was accepted. He had previously been suspended because, it was said, he had refused to give information to the superintendent in order that a death certificate might be filed in. Provision was made for the opening of a new service to be in charge of Dr. J. A. McCarthy, the doctor who has special training for the position and who is the standing of assistant surgeon. Arrangements were made to have a meeting with reference to improved ambulance service and the matter of renewing the contract for salaried work looked into. Information as to an incinerator will be secured at once. The report of Dr. E. J. Ryan, as commissioner of the month was received, and embodied many recommendations for the betterment of the hospital service. Announcement was made that the hospital was to be a beneficiary under the will of the late James H. Lake. Reports were presented upon the opening of the new epidemic hospital and the new outpatient's department in the basement. The report of the superintendent showed that the month had been the busiest in the history of the hospital. There had been twelve deaths. The financial report showed the balance on hand to be \$8,111.98. The report of the superintendent showed that there were sixty-four nurses on the staff. The dietitian reported 2,037 meals served. J. L. O'Brien was appointed commissioner for the month. The payment of bills aggregating \$9,433.73 was authorized.

PRINCIPAL SEES NO HARM IN GIRLS SMOKING PIPES
