LADY BARKER LEFT ESTATE OF \$89,000

Several public bequests Made by Widow of Late Chief Justice.

Several public bequests are included in the will of Lady Mary Ann Barker, widow of Chief Justice Sir Frederick Barker, which was filed for probate before Judge McInerney here this morning. The estate totaled \$89,000, of which \$11,000 was realty and \$78,000 personal property.

Lady Barker left to the St. Paul's (Valley) church \$800; to the Associated Charities, \$100; to the Victorian Order of Nurses, \$100, and to the Women's Auxiliary of the Church of England Missionary Society, \$100. Legacies of substantial amounts were bequeathed to various members of the family. Her residence in Princess street she left to her daughter, Miss Winifred Barker, and the balance of the estate was divided between Miss Winifred and her other daughter, Mrs. Madeline DeMille.

Dr. J. Roy Campbell, K. C., was sworn in as executor and Miss Barker as executrix. Teed & Teed were solicitors.
