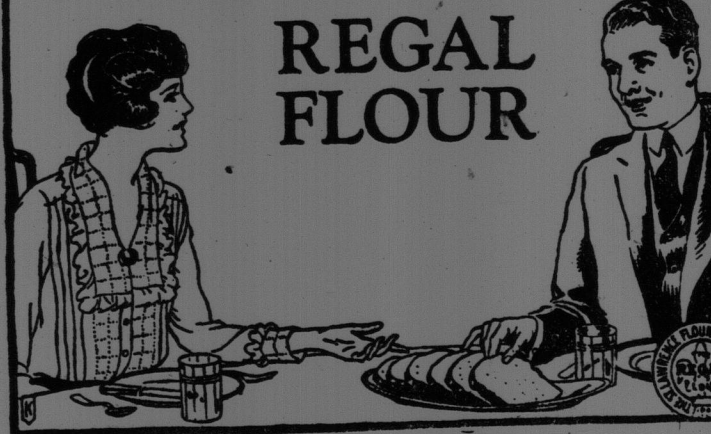

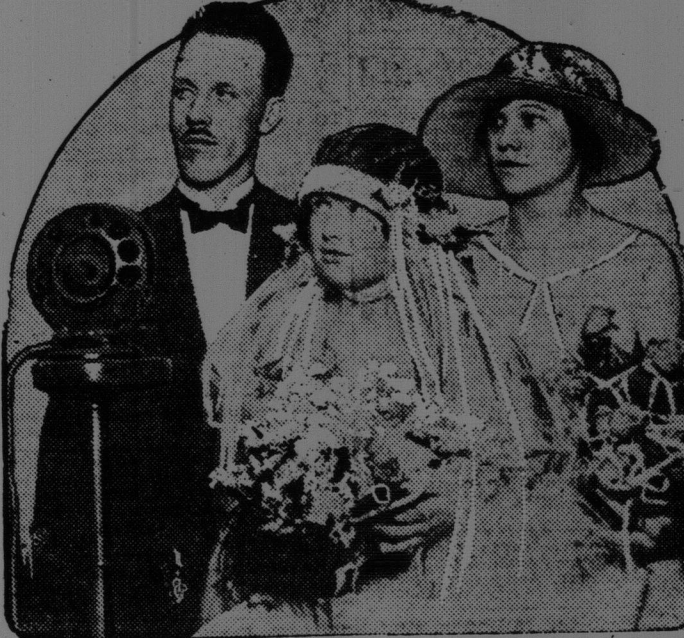

WEST SIDE CHURCH HAD A GOOD YEAR

Charlotte Street Baptist Annual Meeting is Held—Officers Chosen.

The Charlotte street United Baptist church annual business meeting was held last evening with Rev. C. R. Freeman, D. D., pastor, presiding. Excellent reports were received from the various organizations. During the year 17 new members were added, 14 by baptism. The total raised by all branches of the church was \$6,715.07, the largest amount raised for current expenses in recent years. The current expense account showed a balance of \$40.74 and the benevolent fund a balance of \$12.60. The Sunday school raised \$421.08 and had a balance of \$78.45. The sewing circle raised \$235 and had a balance of \$40.30. The choir fund balance was \$19.43. The Sunshine class raised \$192.28 and had on hand \$21.30. The Senior B. Y. P. U. raised a balance of \$4.20. The Intermediate B. Y. P. U. had a balance of \$23.25 and the Junior B. Y. P. U. which raised \$14.65 had a balance of 75 cents. The World Wide Guild raised and paid out \$162. The Ladies' Missionary Aid raised and paid out \$210. The Opportunity Class raised and paid out \$35. The Ever Ready class raised \$75.95 and had a balance of \$16.65. The Ever Ready Sunday class fund amounted to \$18.81 and a balance of \$15.56 remained. The Brotherhood raised \$61.30 and had a balance of \$2.61.

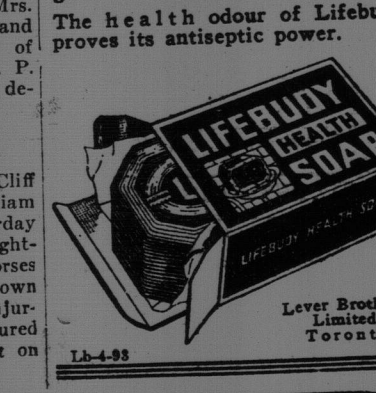

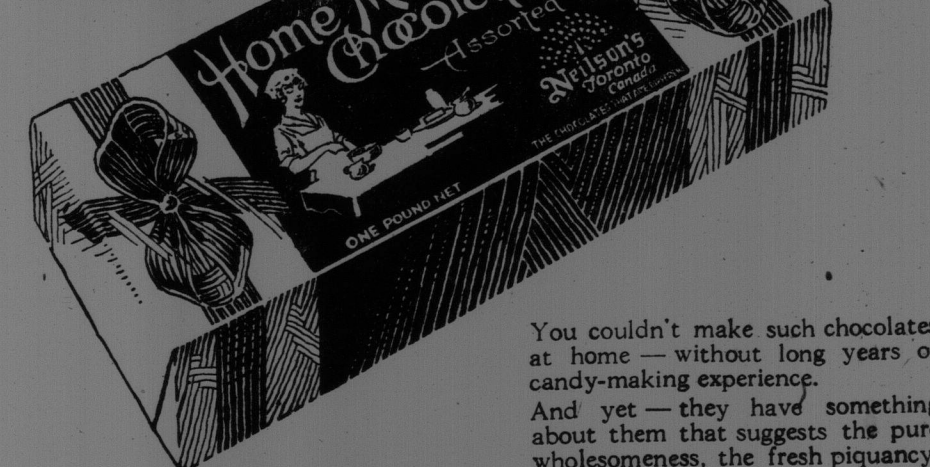

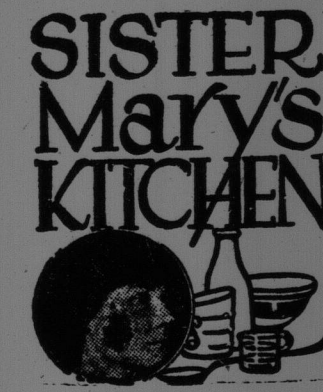

Lose Weight.

Four tablespoons stewed dried apricots, 1 slice lean cold boiled ham, 1 baked stuffed tomato, 2 slices vegetable roast, 1 head lettuce, 4 tablespoons lobster salad, 2 tablespoons prune whip, 1 toasted bran muffin, 2 thin slices rye bread, 1 gluten roll, 1 pint skimmed milk.

Total calories, 1201. Protein, 286; fat, 376; carbohydrate, 539. Iron, .0252 gram.

Stuffed Tomatoes (for Four)

Four medium sized tomatoes, 1 pound spinach, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon butter, 4 teaspoons grated cheese, salt and pepper.

Wash tomatoes, cut a slice from stem and remove seeds. Wash and cook spinach in its own juice. Drain and chop. Strain tomato pulp to remove seeds and add juice to chopped spinach.

Add egg slightly beaten, melted butter, salt and pepper. Mix well and fill tomatoes with mixture. Bake 20 minutes in a hot oven. Five minutes before removing from the oven sprinkle each tomato top with grated cheese. When cheese is melted, serve.

Total calories, 476. Protein, 82; fat, 306; carbohydrate, 88. Iron, .0164 gram.

Gain Weight.

Four tablespoons stewed dried apricots, 1 cup boiled rice, 2 ounces well cooked sausage, 3 cornmeal pancakes, 3 tablespoons maple syrup, 2 slices cold boiled ham, 4 tablespoons potato salad, 1 baked stuffed tomato with 2 tablespoons hollandaise sauce, 1 cup cream mushroom soup, 2 slices vegetable roast, 1 whole candied sweet potato, 4 tablespoons lobster salad, 1 head lettuce, 2 tablespoons oil mayonnaise, 4 tablespoons prune whip sprinkled with 1 tablespoon chopped nuts, 2 tablespoons whipped cream, 3 tablespoons butter, 1 toasted bran muffin, 2 slices rye bread, 1/4 cup cream, 1 tablespoon sugar, 2 slices whole wheat bread, 1 tablespoon marmalade, 1 pint whole milk.

Total calories, 4135. Protein, 483; fat, 1782; carbohydrate, 1860. Iron, .0267 gram.

Lobster Salad (Individual)

Four ounces lobster meat, 1 hard boiled egg, heart of 1 head lettuce, mayonnaise to make moist, salt and pepper.

Slice hard boiled egg and combine with lobster. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice and add enough mayonnaise to hold the mixture together, about 2 tablespoonsful. Add heart of lettuce cut in convenient pieces and put in a bowl lined with outside leaves of lettuce. Mash salad with mayonnaise, garnish with fancy slices of pickled beet and serve.

Total calories, 340. Protein, 116; fat, 191; carbohydrate, 33. Iron, .002 gram.

OPTOMETRISTS ELECT OFFICERS

After a hard day's work—a laboratory study period in the morning, and a business session in the afternoon—the Maritime Optometrists in convention here sought rest and recreation last night in a banquet at the LaTour Hotel, and later in a theatre party at the Imperial Theatre.

The election of officers in the afternoon resulted as follows:—President, G. T. Hutchinson, Charlottetown; first vice-president, J. R. Webster, Kentville; second vice-president, W. G. Stears, St. John.

A resolution of regret was passed in respect to John E. Harbin, of Wolfville, N. S., an officer of their association, who died on December 29 of last year.

PRESBYTERIANS HEAR APPEALS

Financial Support for European Reformed Churches is Asked.

Owen Sound, June 10.—Two appeals for sympathetic consideration and for financial support were made in the Presbyterian General Assembly this afternoon. The first was from Rev. Dr. Alfred Gaudier, principal of Knox College, who spoke on behalf of the ministers of the small reformed churches of Europe, and the second was from Rev. Dr. R. Laird in the interests of the deficit which is crippling to some extent the work of the denomination.

Rev. Dr. Laird spoke of the Presbyterian Church's general financial situation and announced that a week of prayer—a special effort—would be observed from Nov. 2 to Nov. 9 this autumn and that a special offering for the deficit would be made on either Nov. 9 or Nov. 16 as the individual church might choose.

Dr. Laird and Dr. Drummond, who presented the report of the general

board, made a strong appeal on the ground that this was the jubilee year of the church, that the entire debt of the home and foreign mission board might be cleared off this year. The church will expend in the neighborhood of \$1,400,000 and it is asked to provide \$1,800,000 which will take care of all balances now due and also provide for the general work.

CAR NEARLY HIT BY EXPRESS TRAIN

Only through the quick action of J. H. Lee, driver on the McAdam express, in throwing on the air brakes was a party of young people saved from being struck and probably killed by the express at the crossing above the West Station last night. The party were trying to beat the train to the crossing, and in their anxiety probably flooded the carbruator of the car, a Chevrolet sedan, which stalled across the tracks. The glare of the searchlight warned them of their danger and those in the front seat of the car managed to get out but those who were in the rear seat were still in the car when the engine stopped not six inches from them.
