

ANGLIN IS MADE PRIVY COUNCILLOR

Canada's Chief Justice Receives
Honour From Imperial
Government.

LONDON, Feb. 6.—The London Gazette announces that Chief Justice Anglin of Canada has been appointed a Privy Councillor.

Hon. Francis Alexander Anglin, K. C., Chief Justice of Canada, was born in St. John in April, 1865, a son of the late Hon. T. W. Anglin, at one time Speaker of the House of Commons. He was educated in Ottawa and called to the bar in Toronto in 1888. In 1902 he was made puisne judge of the High Court of Ontario and in 1909 he was called to the bench of the Supreme Court of Canada. He was appointed Chief Justice of Canada in September, 1924, in succession to the late Sir Louis H. Davies. The appointment to the Privy Council carries the title of Right Honourable.

A powerful moral lesson is contained in "Broken Laws," Mrs. Wallace Reid's latest motion picture that was given a private showing yesterday afternoon in the Film Booking Office rooms, Mill street, with a representative body of citizens present. The central character is played by Mrs. Reid, who portrays the part of an over-fond and indulgent mother, who in "sparing the rod and spoiling the child," learns that the seeds of disobedience and lack of respect for authority sown in children reap sometimes a terrible harvest in their later years. The climax of the picture comes when the mother hears her favored son pronounced guilty of manslaughter in the courtroom after he had run down and killed an innocent old woman with the motor car she had purchased for him on his birthday. 

EBERT DECLINES TO HELP NEPHEW

Makes No Move to Save Him
From Deportation From
U. S.

BERLIN, Feb. 6.—President Ebert declines to intervene in the deportation from America of a man calling himself his nephew, even to the extent of voicing indirect comment. William Ebert is the son of the President's brother with whom, owing to political disagreement, he has had no contact for 10 years. The man to be deported, if he really is William Ebert, is also a political antagonist of Germany's Socialist Chief Executive, since he is an ardent follower of Adolf Hitler, "The German Mussolini," head of the pan-German Fascists.



"Thirty-five cars containing 760 cattle passed through Winnipeg yesterday from Edmonton. These cattle are being sent to Glasgow, Manchester and Belgium. The consignment will be shipped from West St. John, 500 head of store cattle being equally divided between the ports of Manchester and Glasgow and the 260 butcher cattle will go to Belgium. A further shipment of 1,200 head is

expected to pass through Winnipeg on Feb. 15.

Already there has been a fair movement of cattle through this port but there is hope that the business will be greatly increased before the winter port season ends.

western portion of the road, as far as Chicago and Winnipeg, making a side trip to Indianapolis, near the former home of the president.


